RE: RICHMOND COUNCIL POLICY ON OPEN HOUSES AND SURVEYS

On Feb.10th I was told that the City of Richmond would not permit people to submit a Garden City Lands questionnaire on the internet that was opposed to the development of the Garden City Lands. Attached is a City of Richmond Questionnaire that I submitted under a fictitious name to see if this was true. It was rejected.

The City of Richmond was prepared to accept a submission from long deceased Albert Einstein at a fictitious address on No. 8 Rd. but not accept a simple answer "none of the above" opposing development on the Garden city Lands.

The online reply when the survey was rejected stated:

"Your form has not been submitted. We either had trouble understanding the following fields or we need additional information."

The "City" had trouble understanding why I had refused to support three uses that they wanted me to support if the land could be removed from the ALR. Putting "None of the Above" was not acceptable. Ironically it was acceptable to accept a survey from Albert Einstein at a fictitious address on No. 8 Rd. as long as he supported the ALR exclusion. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to determine that the questionnaire was biased.

At the Open Houses the City only presented the option of removing the Garden City Lands from the ALR to the public.

Our whole public process has changed. Today, Richmond Open Houses are designed to sell the public on whatever is being proposed. Information panels and surveys are prepared by PR firms hired by developers to sell the developers' plans to the public. Questions are pre-tested by the PR firms with "focus groups" to determine which questions are the best for getting the answers desired by their clients.

At one time public information open houses permitted free exchange of ideas and input from


the public. The developer would provide panels for viewing, then make a public presentation to the open house. This was followed by questions and answers and an opportunity for discussion by the public. The presentation was chaired by an impartial person from City staff or a local community Association. The Chair of the Planning Committee and a Planning Dept staff member were expected to attend and answer questions, impartially. Any surveys were open ended to allow all points of view. Results were tallied and reported to Council.

First Council dropped the requirement that the Planning Chair should attend. Then Council dropped the question, answer and discussion session. Then the presentation was left entirely to the developer and PR firm surveys. The final denigration of the civil process was complete with the Garden City Lands when the City became the developer and any semblance of impartiality was lost.

The issue of public process was referred to staff at the last Planning Committee meeting. It should include a return to the original "town hall" type of open house and unbiased surveys carefully prepared by City staff to allow all points of view.
