## STAFF REPORT

#### ORIGIN

Traffic Safety Awareness Week is an annual campaign held by the Global Traffic Safety Committee, Richmond District Parents Association to promote traffic safety to students and parents and to encourage the use of alternative travel methods to get to school. The Year 2000 campaign is the fourth annual event and again will involve all Richmond schools. In a letter to the Transportation Department dated January 31, 2000, the Global Traffic Safety Committee again requested that this year's event (from March 6 – 10, 2000) be endorsed officially by the City (Attachment 1).

#### **ANALYSIS**

#### 1. Purpose

The Traffic Safety Awareness Week is a proactive campaign aimed at educating the public on traffic safety, particularly at and in the vicinity of school sites. Specifically, the purpose of this event is:

- To educate students about traffic safety at an early age;
- To raise the awareness of traffic safety among elementary school students and extend that awareness to secondary school students;
- To educate all drivers, including parents who drive their children to/from school, the importance of respecting the school zone reduced speed limit (30 km/hr) regulation; and
- To encourage the use of alternative travel methods (walking, public transit, and cycling) for the home/school trip.

#### 2. Activities

The slogan of each year's campaign is "DRIVE WITH CARE - KIDS ARE THERE!" and the colour theme is yellow. The main activities for this year's campaign include:

- Distribution of traffic safety kits (supplied by ICBC) to all elementary and secondary schools.
  The kits contain posters, yellow ribbons, safety "reminders", and suggested programs that can be implemented by individual schools;
- Increased presence and enforcement by the RCMP;
- Encouragement of schools to participate in the "Way to Go" program. "Way to Go" is a program aimed at reducing the number of vehicular trips to/from school; and
- Poster contests, yellow theme days, "Walking Wednesday", and other traffic safety-oriented events.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT

None to the City.

## **CONCLUSION**

The 2000 Traffic Safety Awareness Week campaign (March 6 - 10, 2000) is a proactive program intended to educate elementary and secondary school students on traffic safety and to raise the awareness of parents and other motorists on the importance of observing traffic control devices and regulations particularly at and in the vicinity of school sites. Enhancement of traffic safety in the City remains a major initiative of the Transportation Department. Staff therefore request that this event be given endorsement by Council.

The Richmond District Parents Association's Global Traffic Safety Committee is holding Traffic Safety Awareness Week from March 6 to 10, 2000. This is our 4th annual event and involves all Richmond schools.

The purpose of the week is to promote traffic safety to our students and to educate parents and the community about school speed zones. Because of the increase in traffic around our schools, we also try to educate parents about choosing safety over convenience.
