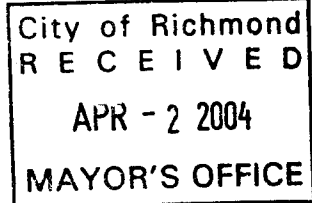

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## **Certificate of Commendation**

# Rescued from a burning wreck

Young rescuer likely saved driver's life

A young man involved in a recent car crash on No. 4 Road may owe his life to the quick thinking of a fellow teenager.

Alex St. Pierre was sound asleep early Jan. 12 when he was awoken at 3 a.m. by a loud crash outside his house on No. 4 Road south of Steveston Highway.

"I thought it was an appliance that blew up," said St. Pierre, a Grade 12 student at Charles E. London Secondary. "It sounded like it was in the house."

It turned out to be a 1997 Pontiac Grand Prix driven by a 19-year-old that, according to police, didn't turn at the curve and wound up running through a chain-link fence and smashing into a tree.

St. Pierre rushed outside. "It was already on fire. It was burning. I wasn't expecting anybody to be able to survive that, but you've got to open the door."

Inside, he found the driver, blood on his face, pinned behind the wheel.

"He said 'can you please help me? I've got to get out.'"

St. Pierre's fire safety training, thanks to his job at Ironwood Chevron, kicked in. He knew there could be a fuel leak and he'd better get the driver away quickly.

"It took a couple of minutes to get him out of the car," he said. "And I had to drag him a great distance."

He was a heavy guy, said St. Pierre, who reckoned his weight about 200 pounds.

"I'm like 155."

In the meantime, his aunt was using a hose to keep down the flames on the car.

Emergency crews arrived soon after.

St. Pierre only learned the driver's name was Dave, and since then hasn't heard how he came out of his injuries.

Due to privacy laws, emergency services were unable to provide the driver's identity.

But Richmond RCMP has

confirmed, however, that alcohol was involved and charges are now being considered against the young man.

St. Pierre said the incident left him shaken up.

"It was actually hours before I could sleep. But I was too tired to do anything."

St. Pierre downplayed his involvement in the inci-

dent, and hasn't said much about it to others, though his actions may have saved a life.

"I just did what I thought was right."

His low-key nature, and the fact the rescue was completed by the time emergency crews arrived, means few noticed a hero in their midst. In fact, it was thanks to a reader that

*The Review* learned of the deed.

"We'd certainly like to recognize it if something like that happened," said Doug Hystad of Richmond Fire Rescue.

Regardless, his mother Lynn is pretty proud.

"I was certainly proud of him, but I was frightened for him. I'm glad everything turned out all right."


