Staff Report

Origin

At the April 15, 2006 Council Meeting, the following staff referral was made:

- 1. Whereas
 - a) Our City is experiencing rapid change as a result of various initiatives and a strong provincial economy, which is fuelling construction projects; and
 - b) This provides us with an unprecedented opportunity to shape our streetscapes and landscapes.
- 2. Therefore be it resolved.

 That staff bring forward a discussion paper for a "Great Places" contest to be held annually in the City.

Analysis

Public places are a stage for our public lives. When cities and neighbourhoods have thriving public spaces, residents have a strong sense of community. Vibrant successful cities have great destinations that offer a variety of activities to the community and provide a place to meet friends, gather families, play or relax.

There is increasing interest in creating "great places" within cities and programs to promote and recognize these types of spaces and places. Great Places increase vibrancy, enable social interaction, provide linkages, create stages for activity, project positive images and provide comfortable places for people. They are social place where residents, workers and visitors like to gather, visiting it again and again.

Landscape architect Allan Jacobs, UC Berkeley Professor Emeritus, coined the phrase 'Great Streets' in his 1993 book of that title. Jacobs asked himself a series of simple questions regarding urban development – "Why are some streets better than others?" He subsequently analyzed a series of 'Great Streets' worldwide in search of an answer. 'Great Streets' play a symbolic, ceremonial, social and political role in the life of a city. Importantly, they provide the ingredients to make the street beautiful and, in turn, to make that beauty memorable.

Great Streets Principles:

- 1. Defined Edges
- 2. Beginnings and Endings
- 3. Linearity
- 4. Physical Comfort
- 5. Building Height/Density

- 6. Street Trees
- 7. Special Design Features
- 8. On-Street Parking
- 9. Quality Design and Materials

Beyond this, Great Places create and promote a sense of belonging, a sense of identify and are a source of civic pride. They can be considered as neutral ground, are convenient and a stage for activity. They "lure" and attract people. In Richmond, many "Great Place's" are already in existence including and certainly not limited to:

- Walking along a dyke trail
- The Gathering Place King George Park (East Richmond)
- Night Market
- Flight Path Park
- Richmond Centre Mall before Opening
- Steveston Village
- The children's playground at Minoru Park

The City has approved principles for the No. 3 Road streetscape impacted by the Canada Line. This has proved to be a very effective process to seek feedback and to shape any future improvements along the No. 3 Road corridor. (Attachment 1)

The City Centre Area Plan (CCAP) is also being prepared to create framework for future development in Richmond's downtown. A set of 10 guiding principles has been prepared to help direct growth and development within Richmond's City Centre Core. (Attachment 2)

The 2006 Street Banner Contest – "Richmond in Focus" has put a call out to photographers to enter their original photographs, either digital or printed hard copy, for the banner display between March 2007 and March 2008. Original photographs will portray activities, experiences and places that make Richmond unique. (Attachment 3)

Staff have considered other options to engage the public, community and businesses in recognizing and celebrating Richmond's Great Places. They are:

- 1. Partner with the Richmond Review and expand the "day in the life" article.
- 2. Host a Richmond Great Places photo contest.
- 3. Run a monthly "Great Places in Richmond" segment in local paper.
- 4. Create and adopt Great Places guidelines that would be considered in all future placemaking planning and programs.

Option 1 - Partner with the Richmond Review to expand the "Day in the Life" (Underway).

Partner with the Richmond Review in their "Day in the Life" photo spread. This "pull out" section highlights the day in the life in Richmond. It runs in July and has been very successful for two years running (Attachment 4). Currently the City of Richmond supplies two photographers whom spend the day taking photos. All the best shots are used in the special insert. The cost to the City is minimal, includes staff time for two staff and currently is funded by the Advertising Budget.

Option 2 - Host a Richmond Great Places photo contest.

Hold an annual City of Richmond's Great Places Photo Contest to promote and enhance community pride in our "Great Places". The costs related to establishing this event will include staff time, advertising in local media, prizes and recognition.

Option 3 - Run a monthly "Great Places in Richmond" segment in local paper.

Run a monthly "Great Places in Richmond" segment in local paper, using a similar format as "Active in Richmond" (**Attachment 5**). Photos would be submitted from the community that highlight their "great place". Questions would be developed to accompany the photo. The value of this space in the newspaper is approximately \$9000.00 per annum.

Option 4 - Create Great Places guidelines that would be considered in all future placemaking planning and programs.

The City could also develop a community/staff and best practices process that defines guidelines and a tool kit for placemaking that, once adopted, could be incorporated in City projects and planning. A policy statement would then be incorporated into the City's City Centre Area Plan, the Official Community Plan and any future projects that incorporate placemaking into the process and design. The costs of this would include staff time, community consultation and research.

Financial Impact

The financial impact of any of these options will need further consideration. Depending on the direction from Council additional financial resources for promotion, recognition, and community involvement will be required.

Conclusion

The City of Richmond is committed to the development of placemaking for the community. Currently, some Great Place principles have been approved and more are being considered (e.g., in the City Centre Area Plan Update). The development of defined guidelines and best practises to be used by all the departments and other initiatives as outlined could help ensure the City creates great places and spaces for future generations to meet friends, gather families, play or relax.

Streetscape Principles

1. Sidewalks


Principles

Continuous, high quality sidewalks up and down No. 3 Road, on both sides of the street. The sidewalk takes 'priority of expression' at intersections, curbs and signals.

Comments

"Needs more extensive planning, presentation and theme".

"A common streetscape typology would greatly unify 'downtown', street trees would help bring the scale down in areas of sidewalk that are next to huge alienating parking lots".






2. Curb Cuts

Principles

Elimination/minimization of driveway curb cuts.

Comments

"If there is limited vehicular traffic there won't be a need for curb cuts!" "Won't you injure yourself when stepping off the curb".

3. Cycle Paths


Principles

Continuous, raised cycle paths on each side of No. 3 Road; preferably separating cyclists and pedestrians from vehicles.

Comments

"There is a need to connect the Canada Line to Garden City Bike lanes and adjacent N/S bike routes".

"Cyclists must be kept separate from pedestrian walkways".





4. On-Street Parking

Principles

Short term on-street parking wherever possible, as a positive signal to the importance of street front retail and to serve as a buffer between pedestrians and vehicles.


Comments

"Could slow down traffic and cause more accidents".

"Short-term parking also needs to be enforced".

"Great idea, is it realistic?".

"It does create a safety buffer between traffic and cyclists/pedestrians".





5. Pedestrian Linkages

Principles


Convenient linkages to transit stations and bus stops, including 'kiss-n-ride' drop-off & pick-up.

Comments

"Parking/drop off loops are necessary".

"Should be a top priority to encourage use of the line".

"Overhead bridge crossings need to connect east and west side of the street" "Don't forget to make them colourful!"



6. Outdoor Rooms


Principles

Public realm urban plazas, boulevards and linear parks, including street trees and greenery along the length of No. 3 Road; all adhering to principles of CPTED (Crime Prevention through Environmental Design).

Comments

"The more greenery the better [to balance concrete construction of the Canada Line]".

"I would encourage covered areas; fabric to allow for greater use of the outdoors when its raining".





7. Street Hardware & Seating


Principles

A coordinated, understated and timeless approach to outdoor furniture, including street lighting complete with banner arms, seating, bollards, recycling bins, information kiosks, and bicycle racks.

Comments

"We are not interested in having a Granville Island".

"Try not to make so generic it's bland, but not too crazy that it looks contrived un-unified".




8. Public Art

Principles

Promote public art within the No. 3 Road Corridor, both at and between transit stations; consider a strategy of 'artful' transit stations.

Comments

"Art will define the street-the 'calls' [for public art projects] should go out worldwide, we need the best of the best".







Guiding Principles

In addition to a strategy of Smart Growth, the following Guiding Principles will be used to help direct growth and development:







Focus on Transit-Oriented Development Maximize opportunities for people to live and work in a pedestrian-focused, high-amenity, mixed-use environment near transit,



Promote Urban Villages Promote the development of Richmond's downtown as a pedestrian-focused, multi-centred network of urban, mixed-use villages and specialty-use precincts



Provide Healthy Housing Opportunities Manage growth to ensure that the City Centre offers opportunities for a broad range of housing types, including a variety of afforcable housing options.



Create Special Development Opportunities Take advantage of the downlown's special attributes re.g., riverfront, aircraft noise flood management occasiderations, the Richmond Oval and the Garden City Lands! to promote new land uses and niche markets



Preserve Openness Manage liigh-rise development in a way that enhances the livability and appearance of the downtown, discourages its encroachment into lower-rise areas, and addresses potential in-pacts on neighbours.



Be a Garden City Oreate a downlown that is characterized by its: • "Great Streets" • High-quality network of parks • unique and dynamic riverfront • Animated, pedestrian-oriented public realm



Promote A Culture of Walking & Cycling Take steps to ensure that both the public and private sectors support walking and cycling as fundamental and integral parts of downtown development.



Create a Place, Not a Design Develop a variety or interconnected outdoor spaces and amenities – urban parks, plazas public art, etc. that foster vibrant human interaction.



Coordinate Development Ensure that City infrastructure and services can keep pace with growth. Develop "win-win" policies for private industry to pay for public amenities.

Contest Rules:

- Minimum 5 MP resolution

- Hard copy images must be printed at a minimum of 5"x 7" for consideration
- All photographs must be unedited
- Maximum 10 entries per contestant
- Photographs containing people must have a completed waiver form (visit www.richmond.ca for downloadable PDF form)
- Each digital file submitted must be identified by your full name and image number. For example: John-Doe001.jpg; John-Doe002.jpg
- Identification including name, mailing address, email address, and phone number must be placed on all CD, DVD, and hard copies.

Selection:

- Six to eight designs will be selected for display on banners in selected locations along Richmond's streets between March 2007 and March 2008.
- A \$250 honorarium will be awarded for each of the selected designs. Winning contestants will be contacted by October 31st, 2006.
- All entries and reproduction rights become the property of the City of Richmond. Artwork may need to be modified to meet the needs of the banner production.







Out and about

Summer Fire Safety Tips

The BC Professional Fire Fighters' Burn Fund would like to remind everyone to take extra care in their summer activities to avoid preventable burns and scalds.

Barbeque -- Propane & Natural Gas

Never use a barbecue indoors; doing so can cause a build-up of poisonous carbon monoxide gas.

After connecting to the propane cylinder, check for leaks by brushing a soap and water mixture over all connections

Prevent cooking grease from dripping onto hoses or propane cylinder Grease build-up is a fire hazard.

When finished barbecuing, make sure the barbecue is turned off and the burner flames are out. Turn off the valves or gas supply and close the barbeque lid.

Gasoline

Store in safety cans or containers that have been approved for the storage of flammables. Store outside the home, away from pilot lights or other sources of ignition

Never use gasoline as a cleaner, a charcoal starter or a solvent. When refusing any engine, turn it off, allow it to cool and extinguish all smoking materials.

Always keep gasoline away from children and pets Never use water to put out a gasoline fire

Protect Yourself and Your Family

Practice Stop, Drop and Roll If you catch on fire Stop where you are Drop to the ground and cover

your face. Roll over and over until the fire is out.

If you are burned, run cool water over the burn. Never apply butter or salve to burns because they

seal in heat and can cause further damage to the skin.












