The Elevated No 3 Route provides maximum ridership over time, structures similar to Canadian Superstore would open up ground level parking with stores above having level access to RAV. Visual objections are invalid since - over next 50 years structures of 2-3 storeys will be needed. Impractical route - poor planning alternative. Why not Garden City along previous Rail line? Makes more sense than Minoru route. #3 Road elevated RAV line will promote more efficient land use along No. 3 Road. Most business is along No. 3 Rd and I feel it's the better choice. If the line is ever extended, No. 3 runs further south.

Preference for No 3 Road alignment - 973 out of 1315 (74 %)

It serves who coming better, in many ways. The elevated track will enhance its appearance of No. 3 Road, not at grade.

An elevated track on No. 3 Rd is the only viable route for the RAV line.

The No. 3 Rd alignment is the best fit for the RAV line for Richmond. There are ample free parking lots on both sides of the street that can accommodate any stations. The "old" 98 B-line centre bus corridor should be retained to accommodate all translink buses leaving the outside lanes for autos. I have no problems keeping the grid-way in the centre of the road over the green spaces. The line should be extended to Park.

Running the RAV line down No. 3 Rd keeps it at a fair distance from residential development and that's great! This is supposed to be a RAPID transit line and putting it on a commercial street is excellent for commerce and shoppers and people that work at various business along this corridor. A station is needed at Richmond Centre without a doubt.

No. 3 is currently a parking lot. Businesses discourage pedestrian use by surrounding buildings with parking lots limiting use of the lots to only while shopping at a specific store. The RAV line will improve pedestrian access with the high buildings either side of No. 3 the elevated (form) is not a concern.

The No. 3 Rd line save you one station to be built. The Alderbridge station covers the Lansdowne shopping centre and the "Saba Rd" Station covers the Rmd Centre Mall plus I'm in the heart of Rmd. There also would be no need anymore to extend the line to Park Rd and spend more money on an expensive additional station.

The Minoru line costs more because you need 2 stations, one Westminster Station plus Rmd centre station. Not building the Rmd Centre station defeats the purpose of the entire line being in the heart of Rmd. On the No. 3 Rd line you save on one station. You cut out the useless Westminster Station. Having the No. 3 rd station on the west side of No. 3 Rd across from Saba Rd. makes perfect sense. I'm in the heart of Rmd plus I can cover both shopping centres. One from Alderbridge station and one from the "Saba Rd" station.

I think No. 3 Road today is ugly and dangerous and I think an elevated system would only be an improvement.

Absolutely not recommended - very short sighted for future development. Minoru line displaces RAV off main 3 Rd line & will discourage ridership due to distance (Lansdowne & college facilities etc)

Please ensure provisions are made for Southward extensions of RAV on 3 Rd to Ladner etc (future park & rides etc) Failure to consider 3 Rd South development now will greatly complicate future RAV Expansion. Good Luck

No. 3 Rd is the projected and price is based thereon. Moving location to Minoru would delay and increase costs. Lets stop acting like fools and get on with it - enough already.

Reasons given on page 1 for supporting Minoru option are dishonest and untrue. Inadequate information is given. This survey is an attempt to fool the public into supporting councils wish without regard to residences wish.

Noise impact on Park Towers residents. Likely anti-social use of Minoru Park by the "after-hours" crowd. Low background noise levels at Minoru Blvd - any noise will be more noticeable. Bus routes will be less direct and integrating the bus routes with RAV will be much more difficult on Minoru. Further expansion of sky train will be contained if it runs south along Minoru.

Very late in the day to be considering such a big change. If this was such a good idea why didn't council have a look at it years ago.

The line should run through a commercial area

I would prefer that the Richmond leg not be built but that Richmond be serviced by buses to a terminal on the Airport line.

Help businesses along No. 3 Rd. Occupants (mostly business people will be less affected (noise, etc.) after business hours, yet residents along Minoru will be affected whole night & daytime.

#3 Road is the commercial road. It will not disrupt any residential view. RAV will destroy the view no mater where it is. I want the increase in crime as far away from me as possible.

No. 3 Rd is business street and is not residential usually everybody come to Richmond for shopping, and best line is center of No. 3 Road because when RAV come to Richmond we don't need B Line (98 to Vancouver)

Would have preferred to have an at grade line in Richmond - or just stayed with the 98-B line which I use tweice - a week - no complaints. P.S. - Fear increased CRIME!! Due to elevated RAV line.

No. 3 Rd traffic is bad. There will continue to be bad traffic and if it moved to Minoru beautiful trees and flowers will be gone.

I prefer the line to run above ground.

That's where the people all want to go on off days and before and after work. That's where all shopping centres and stores are.

I'm so tired of Council not listening to the public the majority - Beauty can be dealt with - be creative design, state of the art, can be put into the elevated line how many ways can the council waste money - Tall Ships - work with business and community, stop power tripping.

I have a business in Richmond for 19 yrs and have great concerns - with concillors not working with the public - eg. During Tall ships and at 1st people had to line up for tickets the tickets could have been available in the shops in the Steveston community also stop assuming we all have email or fox!!!

#3 road Is the main thoroghfare through Richmon; this was always the intended route whereas Minoru is a last minute option (what about Garden City?) #3 is least disruptive to residents and most beneficial to business and shoppers.

Even with #3 Rd option there should be a Richmond Centre terminal included in the design.

Preference for No 3 Road alignment - 973 out of 1315 (74 %)

Stick to No. 3 Rd. Too populated along Minoru Blvd.

Have you considered the criminal element at Rmd Centre if the RAV line concludes at the Centre. Lead iton further to Steveston.

I think Minoru would be better if it stayed North of Westminster. It would be a travesty if the line continued South of Minoru Blvd due to high residential area.

In the early days of RAV discussions, media articles led one to believe that the 2010 Olympics were not informing RAV decisions; at one point that all changed & now the heat is on to complete this massive project "Before Feb. 2010". Can it be done???

That is where the shopping centres are and easier to put in bus loops.

This line is going to be way over budget. Cambie boulevard starts at 25 not 49. We are wasting millions of dollars with this tunnel. Line should have gone down Arbutus.

No. 3 Rd is more direct and will not interfere with residential as it would on Minoru. Many seniors live in the residential of Minoru and many more come from other parts of Lower Mainland as the Minoru Srs. Centre is on Minoru. So is the Minoru Residence which is a Hospital. Crime is often associated with Rapid Transit stations and Seniors in particular are almost certain to be affected.

Property values would be seriously lowered by a line down Minoru. At present Minoru only runs from Alderbridge to Blundell. I believe that keeping the guide rail running on the centre of No. 3 Rd. will have the least amount of impact on the traffic movement in addition stations can be accommodate very easily at all the empty parking lots along the route. The line should stay away from residential development. No. 3 Rd is the main commercial area and should be proposed as such.

Richmond Centre needs a station. Saba Road is just to far from Granville - parks. Westminster station should not be scraped. All translink buses should (commest) it the various stations feeding the sky train at the closerst station possible. Replace b-line with buses using the centre lanes only.

The RAV line should be built on No. 3 Rd as originally proposed and extended to Park - cook Rd facing Richmond Centre. The line should stay away from residential development; existing or proposed. Where possible the elevated line should be in the Centre of the road.

Shops and malls are along No. 3 Road, people coming from Vancouver and East Richmond will use the RAV. Minoru line will bypass Lansdowne Mall, Kwantlen College, Lansdowne Towers and new developments in that area. There is nothing between Cambie and Alderbridge but Ebco. Riverport will partly disappear with the oval and Minoru will be joined. And what about the long-care facility and the parking problem of the end of the line.

This has been a very last minute proposition and as always last minute propositions are bad proposisions, who would get on a rapid transit which has not the desire destination? Why disturb the life of many people with no real purpose.

The "ridership" will be on No. 3, not on Minoru: Kwantlen College, Centre Pointe, Lansdowne, Superstore and innumberable businesses are on No. 3, as well as Richmond Centre. People outside Richmond know No. 3, they do not know Minoru Blvd.

The Minoru Blvd "option" would entirely disrupt the lives of many senior citizens living south of Westminster Highway, not the least those in Minoru Residence; in spite of what Mr. Howard thinks, we are not yet "vegetables".

I prefer option #1 - #3 Rd for the RAV line. It will be more benificial for businesses & give them more axess to transportation for patrons - Minoru wuld be a noise and traffic problem for Minoru hospital & the apart. I want easy access to shopping centrers and grocery stores, etc on No. 3 Rd while I commute to and rom work. I do not want the noise and associated problems outside my front door.

It makes more sense to have the line support the existing businesses along No. 3 Rd. Lansdowne has needed rejuvenation for years for example. Twenty years ago you were not allowed in Richmond to put up a building higher than six stories due to the instability of the ground area. What happens in a serious earthquake when we rely on BRIDGES FOR SURVIVAL? We are looking at a great deal of cement!

Noise and disruption if built along Minoru Blvd would be unfair to residents and in particular those living in the extended care facility, Minoru Residence.

We had a false alarm fire bell on Wed. Dec 15/04. Not enough evening staff know what to do when the fire bell goes. Some residents were awakened - scared. 98 B line is already in operation, it is not necessary for skytrain to run in Richmond.

More cost effective. Disruption to #3 road would cause terrible traffic. Extending the center of Richmond to include Minoru would improve business in the city.

Massive funds already spent on #3 redesign & alignment because of indicated lack of stations, still need transit access along 3 rd. There seems to me to be less disturbance of area along Minoru.

Very concerned about transit access along 3 rd. It is very restricted at present and it seems as thought RAV (as I am able to ascertain) will exacerbate this problem.

Will give easy access to business section without adding to the congestion on #3. What happens to the B line on #3.

Traffic lanes on No 3 Road are already over crowded: the RAV line will only make traffic much worse to the detriment of business. Minoru has much more room to accommodate the RAV line.

Dear Mayor Brodie:

At its December meeting, the Richmond Community Cycling Committee (RCCC) once again discussed at length the implementation of the rapid transit line that is about to become a reality for the City of Richmond. The Committee has shown a keen interest in this project since its conception and has had the opportunity to participate in the predesign by contributing to a focus session facilitated by the project consultants as well as the open houses that the City has provided.

Now that the pre-design phase is wrapping up with a decision as to the alignment that is most suitable, the RCCC feels that it is important to express its views to you on the selection of this alignment while continuing to work with your staff on the inclusion of cycling improvements in the project.

The future health of both ourselves and our community hinges on the availability and promotion of healthy transportation choices. Accordingly, the RCCC urges you to select an alignment that serves this purpose by including a bicycle route along the right of way. It has been promised that bicycles will be carried on the trains themselves, so a bicycle route under the guideway, for example, will allow users to gain access to the train when the origin of their trip is not near a station. As well, when their ultimate destination, or next connection, is along the line, the use of bicycles will enable trips to be completed conveniently.

Equally important, continuous cycling facilities along the line will provide Richmond's City Centre with the safe bicycle access it so sorely lacks. We hope the incorporation of a bicycle route along the RAV Line will be a testament to the viability of the City's transportation vision.

Like myself there are many, many seniors that have purchased homes in the Horizon Towers, and all along Minoru, especially between Westminster Hwy. and Granville Ave. Might I remind you that we are, and have been, a group of citizens who diligently support the City of Richmond, pay our taxes, and are contributing citizens. Many of us moved to this particular location because of the proximity of health services. We did not settle here to have a RAV line run along our street just feet from our doors and windows!

Without question the RAV line will increase traffic, people, noise, vibration, pollution and crime, along with all of the benefits to our city. It is far more logical to locate the line along the commercial route of No. 3 Road rather than along the largely residential route of Minoru, where loyal citizens will be affected in their homes by these disruptions.

Also, have you considered the problem the RAV line would create for the Long Term Care facility on Minoru? The residents, staff, families and emergency services will most certainly be negatively affected.



RAV potential revision defects

- Proposed line end at Saba Rd is 1 Km north of 2 x ½ miles sq. of significant residential development which will reduce ridership. Anderson ending could also retain existing bus connections and better connect to future LRT.
- Reduction to 1 rail lane will decrease railbed obstruction 50% but reduce capacity by reducing frequency potential.

Minoru vs. #3 Road and other options #3 Road Option:

Stations at Aberdeen, Lansdowne, Richmond Centre. Proximity to them plus Yaohan, Parker Place, Empire Centre. Kwantlen College, City Hall, future #3 Road dev. (South of Granville deleted forfeiting access to 2 x ½ mile sq. areas.) Advantages - Reasonable proximity to Westminster Road hotels and Minoru facilities. Reasonable proximity to Alexandra Rd Sheraton. Access to 9 x 1/2 mile sq. sections suitable for downtown zoning, and 1 km from DOT and McLennan development. (9 would be 11 x ½ mile sq. with Anderson station). 1 km to Olympic Oval. Contraindications - Too close proximity at SW Sea Island Way to Comfort Inn, at NE Cambie to Radisson President hotel west side (garbage area and rooms over), at NW Cambie to cellphone/microwave site across the street, at NE Westminster to Residential patio, at NW Westminster to residential, at SW Westminster to residential. Other projects approved or planned. Proximate to many high value opportunities on west side of #3 Road. (Such areas would be suitable for retail commercial space and parking on at least the bottom 4 floors.)

Minoru Road Proposal (Minoru):

Stations at Aberdeen Mall, Lansdowne Mall, Richmond Centre (west). Proximity to same malls but . . . Advantages - 0.3 Km closer to Westminster hotels, Minoru, Oval. Access to 8 x ½ mile sq. sections downtown. zoning, but 0.5 km further from DOT and McLennan development.

Contraindications - Same problems to Alderbridge, plus WRONG side of Richmond Centre for #3 Road access, too close to Hilton & Marriott NW Westminster, 1 NE & 2 SE Westminster residential, rest home SW, 3 residential Minoru, residential SW Granville. (Such areas would be suitable for Commercial and parking only on ~bottom 4 floors.)

Minoru Road Proposal (north railbed part):

Advantages - Avoids Radisson President, cellphone site. Contraindications - Poorer for Aberdeen access and for everything east of it. Adversely impacts options for high potential areas between #3 road and Fraser River Middle Arm. Hazelbridge alternative?: No Radisson intrusion, behind major malls so #3 Rd would be preserved, serving further east. Garden City alternative?: Without significantly increased FAR east of Garden City Rd, RAV isn't viable there.


Future suggested Richmond LRT Routing?

- If within Steveston, Stevestons choice: Option 1) Via former Sockeye line through mid Steveston Park (requires ~5 expropriations + pieces of other property); Option 2) Via Moncton Road; Option 3) Via Westwater /Bayview (requires community support that appears not present); Option 4) End at Railway /Moncton.
- Then along Railway west side from Moncton to Granville.
- Then along Granville center from Railway to Garden City.* (Railway transition, #2, Gilbert, #3, will be traffic issues)
- Then along Garden City center from Granville to Westminster. Then along Westminster center to Shell.
- A line option could continue along Shell east side tracks from Westminster** to Steveston Hwy (Iranwood).
- Another line option could continue north along Shell east side for East Richmond access then west to the casino.

These routings run within 1 Km of three quarters of Richmond including Steveston (Steveston). McMath High, Britannia, Boyd High (West Richmond), Burnett High (Thompson), Minoru Park, Richmond High, RAV, Richmond Centre (City Centre), MacNeil High, Kwantlen College, Lansdowne Centre, DOT Lancs, Nature Park, McNair High, various temples, Ironwood. The route is within 2 km of almost all developed Richmond.

Distance: ~12 Km, plus, perhaps ~1 Km in Steveston, perhaps 5 Km to Ironwood, perhaps 5 Km northeast Richmond.

- * If the RAV line isn't on #3 Road this LRT line could be routed there, but it would increase traffic congestion.
- ** Presumably Shell Road would also be extended from Westminster to King and the area developed.



Re: RAV Line options in Richmond

I have viewed the City's proposals for the Richmond routing. A key point of planning any high capacity, high speed rapid transit system (usually high price as well) is to ensure the route, and in particular its stations, are in the *middle* of potential ridership; it has got to pay. The suggestions you have proposed fail this for the area north of Alderbridge Way. This portion is parallel to and within ½ k.m. of the Fraser River (salmon won't ride).

As your map shows the "Minoru Option" leaving the #3 Road alignment south of Cambie Rd., (even as far south as Lansdowne Rd.), much of the nice portion of #3 Rd. that we spent \$30 million improving will be lost. Any "Minoru Option" should begin at Bridgeport Rd. and return to #3 Rd. by Westminster Hwy. and along to the City Hall. This last portion (Westminster to City Hall) has not had the large expenditures so far, and could use a rework – it is ugly. A well implemented elevated route could improve this area. As an "aside", I would not even use Minoru Blvd. but rather the lane between Minoru and #3 Rd. But back to the main issue, is this a good routing for the RAV at all?

At this point I refer you to the enclosed map. Please use Garden City Rd. and Cambie Rd., then on to the Airport. I have noted the proposed BCIT campus, a potential pay Park and Ride on Sea Island. A future extension south on Garden City Rd. and Granville Ave. is shown. With this later portion constructed, we could sell off much of the Pay Parking lot to offset construction costs.


Since there is also interest by some people, a light rail route could be developed south along the busway on #3 Rd. (to connect with RAV at Cambie Rd.) at lower cost than RAV. The savings on RAV should be tied to (committed to) the suggested light rail. This would end up costing more in the long run, as logically it would fan out in two or three directions south of Richmond Centre. This light rail would delay the need for the RAV extension to City Hall from Garden City and Cambie Rd. by 10 or so years.

Sandy, I have been out of the office and returned to find that the city had been looking for input concerning RAV. I know a response was expected prior to today, but I would appreciate it if you would consider our opinion still and/or forward this on to whomever from the city that was soliciting opinions.

First of all, we believe in RAV and think it will be great for the City of Richmond, its residents and visitors. We are very pleased to see it is going ahead. However, we have grave concerns about it being changed from Number three Road to Minoru Blvd. First of all, as Number three Road is the central north/south hub of transport, servicing the heart of the community, it really belongs there. The plan all the way along has been based on three road, and as Garden City may have been a good alternative as an easy, minimal disruption corridor alternative, it was rejected. I personally think Garden City would be a better alternative than Minoru should there need to be an alternative. But I do think the place where the line belongs is Number three Road.

From a business point of view, should the line come out in front of our business, it would be a disaster during the construction phase, and quite possibly even after construction, depending on how the line is planned, constructed and laid out. Right now Minoru acts as a very effective parallel corridor to number three road, and traffic flow through this part of Richmond could be severely affected if Minoru becomes less friendly to vehicle traffic. In addition, if street widening was required, many businesses along Minoru would lose valuable parking which we all rely on for our customers.

With regards to the construction phase, our showcase store in Richmend draws customers from Richmond, communities to the south, Vancouver and even West Vancouver. A major impediment and disruption like the construction of the RAV line out front would create a mess for our customers and staff, create less customer visits to our store, and it would definitely affect our volume and ability to do business just as it would many of our Minoru neighbours. I can only imagine the havoc that a long construction period would mean to us, our part of the community, and our businesses. As our business operates on thin margins and relies on volume to create earnings, anything that disrupts our ability to turn volume would have a disastrous affect on our business. A major construction outside our front doors with all the traffic turmoil that would ensue would have such an effect and concerns us greatly. Since we are not aware of exactly what Minoru would look like after completion, I can't comment on whether our business could even stay on Minoru or whether we would be forced to relocate after the line was completed. As well I don't know if we could survive being on Minoru during construction.

Should anyone like to discuss our thought over the telephone or in person, I would be pleased to speak to anyone should they be interested in contacting me. I do thank the City of Richmond for being interested in the thoughts of residents and businesses in our community. Thank you for your consultative approach.

Subject – RAV option on Minoru

I have attended three of the City's Open House's and discussed many aspects of the Minoru option with City staff. In my Nov. 29th, 2004 presentation to Council I voiced my objection to the Minoru option. I would like to expand on that presentation:

RAV VEHICLE NOISE WILL MAKE TOWNHOUSE LIVING INTOLERABLE

The present Minoru traffic in front of my Townhouse is primarily daytime and consists of soft tired vehicles. At night there is very little traffic on Minoru and therefore is a quiet street.

The proposed RAV vehicle will pass by the front of the eight Townhouses <u>every three (3) minutes!</u> Hours of operation are expected to be 5:30 am till 2:00 am. A roughly 3 hour break from incessant noise!

The RAV cars will be twenty-seven feet (27 ft) from the face of my Townhouse per the Open House drawings. My kitchen, dining room, living room and windows for both bedrooms are all on the Minoru Blvd. side. This is an intolerable situation in which to live.


The Richmond Centre Mall terminus proposed would have the whine of accelerating RAV vehicles and the deceleration braking noise. All of this easily heard from my south-facing balcony. A distance of roughly 100 feet!

The constant and repetitive noise will make life in my Townhouse intolerable.

VIBRATION WILL BE INTOLERABLE

Ground-borne vibration is a serious concern for nearby neighbours of a transit system route, causing buildings to shake and rumbling sounds to be heard. The effects of ground-borne vibration include feelable movement for the building floors, rattling of windows, shaking of items on shelves or hanging on walls, and rumbling sounds. The vibration of the transit structure excites the adjacent ground creating vibration waves that propagates from the foundation throughout the remainder of the building structure. Resonant effects of building components compound the problem. The rumble is the noise radiated from the motion of the room surfaces. In essence, the room surfaces act like a giant loudspeaker. This is called ground borne noise.

Ground-borne vibration is almost never annoying to people who are outdoors. Although the motion of the ground may be perceived, without the effects associated with the shaking of a building, the motion does not provoke the same adverse human reaction. In addition, the rumble noise that usually accompanies the building vibration can only occur inside buildings.



Structures within 50 feet are severely affected. The Townhouses at 6088 & 6080 Minoru Blvd. are approximately 27 feet from the RAV train and less than that from the concrete pillar and footings. The frequency of the RAV vehicle passing will be 3 minutes. The situation is intolerable! The Townhouses (eight of them) will be unlivable. The vibration situation may be very little different for the Kiwanis Court residents, Minoru Residence facility, or the third floor Horizon's residents.

FUTURE TRAFFIC CONGESTION IN RESIDENTIAL CORRIDOR

Minoru Blvd. between Granville and Westminster Highway will suffer from acute traffic congestion if Minoru is used for the RAV line; busses and vehicles picking up and dropping off passengers will increase significantly. Note that moving the Minoru terminus further North to Westminster Highway will also increase traffic in the Residential Corridor.

The problem is compounded by no access or egress from the residential corridor, new high-rises being proposed (647 parking stalls), and Richmond Center Mall traffic including the movie theatre traffic. The suggestion by the Traffic Consultant at the Open House that changing the pedestrian controlled lights to full lights will just impede the traffic flow. The moving of the RAV line to Minoru will destroy a well running street.

DETERIORATION OF ACCESS & EGRESS TO HORIZON'S PARKING LOT

The access and egress from the below ground parking for Horizons Towers A & B is in the middle of the block. Sandwiched between two Richmond Center Mall entrances/exits. One of these Mall exits is less than 10 feet from the Horizons entrance and exit. The Horizon's vehicle traffic must enter the street, not at a controlled intersection but into a stream of traffic. This stream of traffic will increase significantly with a RAV terminus on Minoru and adversely affect residents from going in or out of our parking lot.

There is increased potential for vehicle and pedestrian accidents in this congested corridor.

ESTHETICS OF MINORU BLVD WILL DETERIORATE

Minoru Blvd. between Westminster Highway and Granville is primarily a residential corridor with the exception of the Richmond Centre Mall, Police Station, Library and School Offices. A pleasant environment, well treed, nice boulevards, attractive greenery and flowers. The proposed RAV line option on Minoru will destroy the esthetics of this pleasant primarily residential area. The views from the high-rise apartment balconies will be plain ugly.

ADVERSE AFFECT ON HORIZON'S UNDERGROUND PARKING AIR QUALITY

The Horizon's A & B underground parking is ventilated by a number of large street level intakes for "fresh air". The increase of traffic, including diesel busses could well make the air quality unhealthy in the underground parkade.

ADVERSE AFFECT ON HORIZON'S UNDERGROUND PARKING WATER SEAL

The underground parking of both Tower "A" & "B" are below grade level with a delicate type shell that keeps water out. The close proximity of LRT vehicles transmitting ongoing vibration could well rupture this shell. Construction activity and ongoing vibration present a high risk to our residences both below and above grade. The risk is high and who will bear the financial liability if there are problems?

ADVERSE AFFECT ON HORIZON'S TOWNHOUSE AIR QUALITY

The fresh air ventilation for the Townhouses comes through either open windows or when they are closed from a single vent designed for that purpose. The vent in question is on the front of the building facing Minoru and about 20 ft. from the road surface. Thus the air quality inside the Townhouse is directly related to the pollution level outside the Townhouse.

The increase in traffic, particularly busses, could quite likely bring the vehicular pollution over that tolerable in the Townhouses. Note that the nearby Commercial parking zone for townhouse moving vans and maintenance vehicles had to be shifted south so that idling vehicles did not pollute the Townhouse air. Increased traffic will result in increased idling in front of the Townhouses. Again the running of RAV down Minoru will degrade the quality of living in the Townhouses.

HORIZONS TOWNHOUSE VIEW OBSTRUCTED

The views from the Horizon's Townhouses will all be obstructed by a two Meter concrete RAV railbed and some will be facing a five and a half Meter concrete support structure. All Townhouses have their, kitchen, dining room, living room and two bedroom windows facing Minoru. These concrete structures are within nine Meters of these windows. Sunlight, sunsets and what was a pretty boulevard (come see the Cherry trees in the middle of the boulevard, in front of Town House #2, blossom in the spring time!), will be gone.

In addition sitting out on either of the balconies (with your earplugs in) would be an Orwellian example of the "New Richmond".

CRIME ASSOCIATED WITH TERMINUS

The proposed Minoru terminus at either Richmond Centre or north of Westminster Highway is too close to Minoru Park facilities. RAV stations do not have washrooms. The Library, Skating Rink, Swimming Pool will attract undesirables. The children's playground and the senior center are also to close to the proposed terminus at Richmond Centre. These facilities and washrooms will become a haven for many undesirable factions.

Children and seniors should not be subjected to the risk of a nearby RAV terminus. Keep the terminus on No. 3 Rd.

MINORU NOT APPROPRIATE FOR RAV

The majority of residents that I know in the residential corridor of Minoru are seniors. They generally moved from houses into an area that was reasonably quiet, required no car, and had excellent shopping and senior services. To run a noisy, ugly RAV system through our neighbourhood is an insult.

DECISION MAKING ON MINORU PREMATURE

The "Open House" sessions did not answer the real concerns of residents. Noise, vibration, construction disruption, light pollution, environmental risks. These issues were passed off as RAVCO responsibility, or as studies not done. How are the people in Richmond expected to make an informed decision?

This change from No. 3 Rd. was foisted off on the public Nov. 23rd, topped off by quick public meetings under the guise of a democratic process, and a survey all by Dec, 15th. I am not impressed. Again the trite phrase "obscene rush" come to mind.

REAL ESTATE VALUES REDUCED OR DESTROYED

The residential real estate values for properties in close proximity to the Minoru RAV line will decrease. The values for the eight Horizons Townhouses, with there face only twenty-seven feet from the RAV line will likely collapse.

A similar scenario will not happen with the No. 3 Rd. option, as there are few, if any, close residences on No. 3 Rd.


There are many bad outcomes in selecting Minoru over No. 3 Rd. I totally reject the usage of Minoru for the RAV line.



Richmond-Airport-Vancouver (RAV) Rapid Transit Line in Richmond **Frequently Asked Questions**

1. Why do we need a Richmond-Airport-Vancouver Rapid (RAV) Transit Line?

The north-south corridor between Richmond, the Airport and Vancouver is one of the busiest in the region with one-third of the region's employment and 20% of its population. Over the next 20 years, the population will grow significantly; by 50% in Vancouver's central business district and by 75% in central Richmond. By 2021, employment will grow by 25% in Vancouver's central business district, 70% in central Richmond and 70% at the airport. Congestion is increasing, which increases air pollution, hinders our economy and impairs our quality of life.

2. How much will the RAV line cost?

It is estimated that the RAV rapid transit line will cost up to \$1.72 billion to build.

3. Why are we spending all this money on the RAV line?

The RAV line will provide a reliable means to move large volumes of passengers without being affected by increasing traffic congestion caused by single-occupant vehicles. It is the only environmentally responsible way to move a large number of people in the long term. Major roadway improvements are also planned throughout the region as part of TransLink's 3-Year Plan to improve goods movements (see TransLink's web site at http://www.translink.bc.ca/).

4. Are Richmond taxpayers paying for the RAV line?

The capital cost of the project is being funded by both the federal and provincial governments, TransLink, YVR, and SNC-Lavalin, the private proponent. During the operating phase, SNC-Lavalin will receive payments over the next 30-35 years from TransLink funded from the new revenue stream the system is expected to generate, as well as associated savings in the cost of the transportation network. Both cities, Richmond and Vancouver, are contributing small financial amounts to re-construct local roads for the RAV line.

5. Why did Council endorse an elevated rapid transit system?

Council endorsed an elevated rapid transit system in Richmond (approved by TransLink, December 1, 2004) after it became clear an at-grade light rail system would not be built by RAVCO.

6. Why is an alternative alignment along the Minoru corridor being considered?

The Minoru corridor is being considered in order to achieve a RAV alignment that is appropriate for the community. Shifting the partial alignment to the Minoru corridor and locating the terminus station either north or south of Westminster Highway may result in: reduced project costs; less disruption during construction; opportunities for greater real estate benefits; opportunities for better visual fit; and increased re-development opportunities throughout the vicinity.

7. What does Council want to know from the Richmond community?

City Council wants to hear which alignment the Richmond community prefers, prior to final decisions made about the alignment.

8. What would be the alignment along Minoru Boulevard?

The exact alignment (middle of the street or on one side) has not yet been decided and will require further study if the Minoru corridor is deemed feasible.

9. Will more land be acquired for either alignment (Minoru versus No. 3 Road)?

If the system follows the Minoru alignment, it is anticipated that it will generally fit within the existing right-of-way north of Cambie Road. Some property acquisition will be required further south, depending on the transition point from No. 3 Road, with the extent to be determined by further study if the Minoru corridor is deemed feasible.

If the RAV line is on No. 3 Road, it is anticipated that it will generally fit within the existing right-of-way north of Westminster Highway with some property acquisition required for the southern terminus station in the vicinity of Saba Road (or Cook Road/Park Road if the line is extended).

10. What happens to traffic on Minoru Boulevard or No. 3 Road?

If the RAV line is built on Minoru Boulevard, it is anticipated that the existing general purpose traffic lanes on Minoru Boulevard will remain. Existing intersections will continue to function with full turning movements permitted, and the roadway may be widened to provide new left-turn bays north of Elmbridge Way under the elevated guideway.

In the current approved RAV project, the existing general purpose traffic lanes on No. 3 Road (2 lanes in each direction plus left-turn lanes at intersections) will remain. Property acquisition south of Westminster Highway will likely be required to maintain the existing 4 lanes of traffic and left-turn lanes.

11. Who will make the final decision on the alignment of the RAV line in Richmond?

TransLink and Richmond City Council have both recently approved an elevated RAV line on No. 3 Road. The City of Richmond is working with RAVCO, TransLink and SNC-Lavalin to determine if the current approved RAV line should be shifted in part to the Minoru alternative alignment in Richmond. The RAVCO Board will make a final decision on the RAV alignment by March 2005, based on the outcome of the feasibility studies, which include the results of the City's public consultation.

12. How will current Richmond bus passengers be affected by the RAV line?

Existing bus routes between Richmond and Vancouver would be adjusted to feed into the RAV line from various areas within Richmond. It is expected that current Vancouver-bound bus passengers would transfer from buses to the RAV line at the two main transfer points: Bridgeport and the southern terminus. Some local buses may change their routings to provide better coverage on local destinations for bus passengers travelling within Richmond.

13. How long will construction of the RAV line take? How do you access businesses during that time? Construction is anticipated to begin in Spring 2005 with the RAV line operational by November 2009. RAVCO will work with local businesses, residents and the Cities of Vancouver and Richmond to minimize and manage the construction and traffic related impacts once the design of the rapid transit system is finalized.

14. Is safety and security a concern with the RAV line coming to Richmond?

Richmond RCMP will be involved in the planning of RAV by providing their input to ensure that the station environment will deter criminal activities. In addition, provision for possible future turnstiles is being considered at the new stations to deter fare evaders. Special transit police are being established by TransLink to partner with local police to carry out more effective enforcement on illegal activities that may occur along the line.

15. Will there be more public consultation in the future?

Yes. RAVCO and SNC-Lavalin will be completing public consultation programs beginning with the Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) application, and for the Preliminary and Final Design Phase. To learn more, visit RAVCO's web site at http://www.ravprapidtransit.com/en/.

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



Council seeks community input for RAV on Minoru

Richmond City Council wants to determine the level of community support for a rapid transit line along the Minoru corridor south of Cambie Road, with the line ending at Westminster Hwy or Richmond Centre Mall prior to the final decision on the Richmond-Airport-Vancouver (RAV) alignment.

Council accepted an elevated rapid transit system in Richmond after it became clear an at-grade light rail system would not be built. The RAV project received final approval from the TransLink Board on December 1. As a means to ensure the best community fit for an elevated rapid transit system in Richmond, City staff, RAVCO, TransLink and SNC-Lavalin are working together to determine the best possible route, or alignment, in Richmond.

The current proposal by SNC-Lavalin calls for line to be built along the east side of No. 3 Road from Bridgeport Station to the terminus station at Saba Road, with an extension to Park Road subject to funding. As an alternative, the RAV line could be shifted off No. 3 Road to Minoru Boulevard at Cambie Road, Alderbridge Way or Lansdowne Road, with the terminus station located at Westminster Highway or Richmond Centre Mall.












