Staff Report

Origin

At the request of the Community Safety Committee, the Officer in Charge will keep Council informed on matters pertaining to policing in the Richmond community. This monthly activity report for the RCMP provides information on each of the following areas:

This report supports Council's 2014-2018 Term Goal #1 A Safe Community:

Maintain emphasis on community safety to ensure Richmond continues to be a safe community.

Analysis

Activities and Noteworthy Files

Large Fire

On June 13, 2017, Richmond RCMP was called to assist Richmond Fire Rescue with a large fire on Mitchell Island. The fire originated at a mattress recycling facility; the matter is under investigation.

Dog Bite

On June 13, 2017, Richmond RCMP received a complaint regarding a large Rottweiler running at large at Saunders Road and No. 3 Road. The owner was able to secure the dog and the complainant was treated by Emergency Health Services for a small puncture wound. The matter is under investigation.

Hit and Run, Dangerous Operation, Impaired

On June 22, 2017, Richmond RCMP officers were conducting a road block at Granville Avenue and Garden City road when a vehicle drove into the rear of an unoccupied parked police vehicle. The police vehicle was pushed into a hydro pole. The driver subsequently drove away from the scene. The driver struck another vehicle at No. 3 Road before being arrested.

Canada 150

Richmond RCMP wanted to do something special in celebration of Canada 150. On June 30, 2017 RCMP members wearing red serge and members of the local community came together to show their Canada 150 spirit. A photograph was taken in a full size hockey rink with an oversized Canadian flag (Attachment 1).

Analysis of Crime Statistics

Arson

In June 2017, there were four incidents of arson, which is a 20 per cent decrease from May 2017 and a 60 per cent decrease from June 2016. Arson at this time is within the five-year statistical average range.

Assault Serious (Assault with a Weapon)

There were 14 assault serious events, which is a 17 per cent decrease from May 2017 and a 12 per cent decrease from June 2016. Assault serious is within the five-year statistical average range.

Auto Theft

There were 21 auto theft incidents, which is a eight per cent decrease from May 2017 and a 34 per cent decrease from June 2016. Auto theft is within the five-year statistical average range.

Drugs

There were 67 drug incidents, which is a decrease of 28 per cent from May 2017 and a 20 per cent decrease from June 2016. Drug incidents are within the five-year statistical average range¹.

Residential Break and Enter

There were 46 break and enters, which is a two per cent decrease from May 2017 and no change from June 2016. Residential break and enters are within the five-year statistical average range.

Sexual Assault

There were eleven sexual assault offences, which resulted in a 57 per cent increase from May 2017 and a 15 percent decrease from June 2016. Sexual offences are above the five-year statistical average range. The spike in June is a result of child pornography seizures at YVR and several incidents of inappropriate touching by strangers in public.

Even though June 2017 shows a decrease, drug incidents are still on pace to meet the five per cent increase benchmark as noted in the Annual Performance Plan.

Shoplifting

There were 51 shoplifting thefts, which is a 13 per cent decrease from May 2017 and a 29 per cent decrease from June 2016. Shoplifting is below the five-year statistical average range.

Theft from Auto

There were 127 thefts from auto incidents, which is a 25 per cent decrease from May 2017 and a 36 per cent decrease from June 2016. Theft from auto is below the five-year statistical average range due to the Detachment's focus on crime reduction initiatives.

Violent Crime

There were 140 violent crime incidents, which is a 13 per cent increase from May 2017 and a two per cent decrease from June 2016. Violent crime is above the five-year statistical average range.

Auxiliary Constables

In June 2017, the Richmond RCMP Detachment (the Detachment) had a total complement of 37 auxiliary constables, who provided 250 volunteer hours. There was a 47 per cent decrease of hours from May 2017 and a 0.8 per cent increase from June 2016.




Figure 1: Auxiliary Constables Volunteer Hours

Figure 1 compares the monthly hours of service provided by month from 2013 to 2017.

Auxiliary Constable Activities

Auxiliary Constables attend events in the community to promote a positive police presence, support regular RCMP members and provide traffic and crowd control. During the month of June auxiliary constables participated in:

Block Watch

At the end of June 2017, the Block Watch program had 441 groups totaling 10,066 participants. Currently, the program includes 582 captains, which is an increase of two captains, two groups, and 28 participants.

Community Police Station Programs

Community police stations continue to enhance the Detachment's policing service by providing an array of crime prevention resources and community safety initiatives. City staff and volunteers pursued safety initiatives to enhance crime prevention program awareness, community engagement, police accessibility and to reduce anxiety and fear levels related to crime. The demographics of the programs vary from month to month reflective of weather conditions, seasonal initiatives, events and the availability of the volunteers.

During the month of June volunteer highlights included:

- The deployment of 23 foot/van patrols totalling 165.5 hours and 18 bike patrols totalling 170 hours;
- 24 Fail to Stop deployments which resulted in 749 warning letters;
- Speed Watch on 6,904 vehicles at various locations in Richmond;
- Lock Out Auto Crime on 10,007 vehicles at various locations in Richmond;
- June 1, 2017, a bicycle registry event resulting in 40 bikes registered at Burnett Secondary School;
- June 7, 2017, a school sports event at Homma Elementary School;
- June 7, 2017, an ALS Golf Tournament in participation with the auxiliary constables;
- June 11, 2017, an Island Bike Tour and Project 529 Bike Registration event resulting in 41 bikes registered;

- June 15, 2017, a Disability Pride March in participation with the Crime Prevention members;
- June 21, 2017, a School Sports event at Cook Elementary School in participation with Crime Prevention and Youth Section members:
- June 24, 2017, a South Arm Block Party Canada 150 event where the Distracted Drivers Obstacle course was deployed; and
- June 28, 2017, at McNair Secondary School year end carnival event where the Distracted Drivers Obstacle course was deployed as well.




Figure 2: Distracted Drivers Letters Sent




Figure 4: Speed Watch Letters Sent

Crime Prevention Unit

Crime Prevention reduces crime and enhances community engagement through public awareness and dialogue initiatives. During the month of June, the Crime Prevention unit participated in the following events/activities:

Road Safety Unit

The Road Safety Unit makes Richmond's roads safer through evidence-based traffic enforcement, investigation of serious vehicle collisions and public education programs. The statistics below compare June 2017 data to both April 2017 and May 2017.

The Moving Violations category refers to violations such as unsafe lane change and unsafe passing. The Vehicle category refers to motor vehicle regulation defects such as no insurance and no lights. The Other category refers to other motor vehicle infractions such as miscellaneous charges including fail to remain at the scene of accident and failing to stop for police.

Victim Services

In June 2017 Richmond RCMP Victim Services provided on-going support to 59 clients and attended 10 crime/trauma scenes. The unit currently maintains an active caseload of 140 ongoing files.

In addition, Victim Services responded to a number of cases involving family conflict, suicide, and sudden death. Victim Services provides on-going emotional support and on occassion refers clients for long term assistance.

Youth Section

The Detachment's Youth Section focuses on strategies that contribute to safe and healthy behaviours essential to the development of productive and civic-minded adults. During the month of June Youth Section members highlights included:

Auxiliary Constables

- The primary mandate of Richmond's Auxiliary Constables is to support community policing activities related to public safety and crime prevention.

Block Watch

- Community-based crime prevention program aimed at helping neighbors organize themselves to prevent crime.
- Residents can receive email alerts of neighbourhood residential break and enters by registering their email addresses at: blockwatch@richmond.ca

Difference Maker Project

• The Difference Maker Project is an off-shoot of the School Sports Programs. Elementary school students are mentored by teachers, police officers and community ambassadors. This activity aims to encourage social and civic responsibility amongst elementary and secondary school aged youth through community projects.

Distracted Driving Program

- Trained volunteers monitor intersections and observe distracted drivers.
- A letter is sent to the registered owner of the offending vehicle with information on the safety risks associated to the observed behaviour and applicable fine amounts.

Fail to Stop

- Trained volunteers monitor areas that have been referred to the program by local businesses or residents where drivers are not making a full stop at the stop sign, or running a red light.
- An information letter is sent to the registered owner of the vehicle advising them the
 date, time and location and applicable fine amounts if the driver received a violation
 ticket.

Lock Out Auto Crime

- Co-sponsored by the Insurance Corporation of BC (ICBC), volunteers patrol city streets and parking lots looking for automobile security vulnerabilities.
- Notices supplied by ICBC are issued to every vehicle inspected indicating to the owner what issues need to be addressed in order to keep the vehicle and contents secure.

Project 529

- This program allows riders to easily and securely register their bikes. This up-to-date database of bikes alerts its registrants if a fellow 529 bike is stolen.
- Project 529 is a unique, multi-national registry that holds a database of all registered and stolen bikes.

Speed Watch

- Co-sponsored by ICBC, promotes safe driving habits by alerting drivers of their speed.
- Trained volunteers are equipped with radar and a speed watch reader board that gives drivers instant feedback regarding their speed.
- Volunteers record the license plate number and the speed, and a letter is sent to the registered owner of the offending vehicle. The letter includes the date, time and location and applicable fine amounts if the driver received a violation ticket.

Stolen Auto Recovery

- Co-sponsored by ICBC, trained volunteers equipped with portable computers identify stolen vehicles.
- These volunteers recover hundreds of stolen vehicles each year throughout the Lower Mainland.

Volunteer Bike and Foot Patrol Program

• Trained volunteers patrol Richmond neighbourhoods reporting suspicious activities and providing a visible deterrent to crime and public order issues.

June 2017 STATISTICS RICHMOND RCMP

This chart identifies the monthly totals for founded Criminal Code incidents, excluding traffic-related Criminal Code incidents. Based on Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) scoring, there are three categories: (1) Violent Crime, (2) Property Crime, and (3) Other Criminal Code. Within each category, particular offence types are highlighted in this chart. In addition, monthly totals for Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (CDSA) incidents and MHA-related calls for service are included. Individual UCR codes are indicated below the specific crime type. For 2017, some inclusion criteria have been modified to improve accuracy and accommodate RCMP scoring regulations. For more information, contact Richmond Crime Analysts.



If the current monthly total for an offence is above the expected average range (using a standard deviation), it will be noted in red, while below expected numbers will be noted in blue. 




