### **Staff Report**

# Origin

This monthly report for the Animal Protection Services department provides information and statistics for enforcing bylaws related to Animal Protection Services as well as education and public awareness initiatives.

This report supports Council's Strategic Plan 2018-2022 Strategy #1 A Safe and Resilient City:

Enhance and protect the safety and well-being of Richmond.

1.1 Enhance safety services and strategies to meet community needs.

This report supports Council's Strategic Plan 2018-2022 Strategy #8 An Engaged and Informed Community:

Ensure that the citizenry of Richmond is well-informed and engaged about City business and decision-making.

8.2 Ensure citizens are well-informed with timely, accurate and easily accessible communication using a variety of methods and tools.

# **Analysis**

#### **Animal Protection Services**

Construction on the City's Animal Shelter has been substantially completed with final adjustments taking place within the building and the surface parking lot. These adjustments are expected to be completed by June 2022. The BC SPCA is currently in the process of readying the shelter for occupancy for both BC SPCA staff and Richmond animals currently being housed at the BC SPCA Vancouver Animal Shelter. A memo will be sent to Mayor and Council advising of the date for the re-opening ceremonies.

The City's Animal Control Regulation Bylaw No. 7932 (Animal Control Bylaw) oversees beekeeping. During the month of April, the Manager of Animal Protection Services attended a local apiary, overseen by the Richmond Beekeepers Association (RBA), located at the Richmond Christian School. The purpose of the visit was for staff to learn about bees and to assist the RBA to promote awareness of the importance of bee season, which runs from April to September. Pollinator bees play a significant role in the growth of trees, flowers and plants and are vital to agricultural and the ecosystem. Ms. Cathie Schneck, Vice Principal of Richmond Christian School (and a volunteer at the apiary) and Hugh Mawby, a long time member of the Richmond Beekeepers Association demonstrated safety protocols when interacting with the apiary during the staff visit. Ms. Schneck and Mr. Mawby were generous with their time and knowledge. The City's social media platforms will be sharing the importance of honeybees to the community beginning in May 2022 and throughout the summer months.

During the month of April, postings were placed on the City's social media platforms as a reminder to the public that rabbits "don't make good Easter gifts". Pet rabbits require daily care and can live up to the age of 11, which may leave them subject to abandonment within City parks and lands.

In April, the total number of dogs licensed was 175. This figure represents 67 new dog applications and 108 dog licence renewal applications. The total number of dogs licensed year to date is 6,777. To date there are 881 outstanding 2021 dog licence accounts in arrears. Both the Animal Protection Services department and the BC SPCA have begun collecting the dog licence arrears through the annual canvasing program.

For the month of April, BC SPCA Officers received 176 calls for service related to various animal control and dog licensing infractions while proactively patrolling a combined total of 46 parks, dikes and/or schools.

In the month of April, BC SPCA Officers conducted an "off-leash sting" in non-designated off-leash parks to educate dog owners and issue violations if necessary. The majority of dog owners were in compliance with the Animal Control Bylaw and, as a result, only one violation notice was issued at South Arm Park for failure to leash a dog.




Figure 1: Animal Protection Services Violation Issuance Comparison

Figure 1 below reflects the monthly and year-to-date animal control and dog licensing enforcement activity measured by violation issuance. The corresponding revenue is reflected in Figure 2. For the month of April, BC SPCA Officers issued 50 bylaw violation notices, which can be attributed to the annual dog licence canvassing program together with BC SPCA Officers foot patrols of non-permitted off-leash parks, City dikes and school grounds. These proactive patrols have resulted in ticketing for non-compliance of both the Dog Licencing Bylaw No. 7138 and the Animal Control Bylaw together with educational compliance.
