Staff Report

Origin

At the request of the Community Safety Committee, the Officer in Charge will keep Council informed on matters pertaining to policing in the Richmond community. This monthly activity report for the RCMP provides information on each of the following areas:

1. Activities and Noteworthy Files
2. Analysis of Crime Statistics
3. Auxiliary Constables
4. Block Watch
5. Community Police Stations and Programs
6. Crime Prevention Unit
7. Road Safety Unit
8. Victim Services
9. Youth Section and Programs

This report supports Council's 2014-2018 Term Goal #1 A Safe Community:

Maintain emphasis on community safety to ensure Richmond continues to be a safe community.

Analysis

Below is the RCMP's monthly report for August 2016.

1. Activities and Noteworthy Files

Recovered Stolen Vehicle

On August 3, 2016, Richmond RCMP assisted Vancouver Police with a vehicle that had been stolen. The vehicle was stopped on the Dinsmore Bridge utilizing a spike belt. The occupants of the vehicle attempted to flee but were apprehended, arrested and taken into custody.

Recovered Stolen Ambulance

On August 4, 2016, an ambulance that was stolen from an automotive repair business in Richmond was found in a parking lot on Valmont Way. The vehicle was found to be undamaged.

Fraud in Progress

On August 7, 2016, Richmond RCMP responded to a complaint of a fraud in progress at a rental car business. A male suspect attempted to obtain a vehicle with a fake credit card. Officers arrested the male and took him into custody.

Break and Enter

On August 17, 2016, Richmond RCMP was dispatched to a construction site in response to a complaint of a break and enter in progress. A security company reported that a suspect was seen entering the construction site. Upon arrival, officers could hear cutting noises emanating from the yard. The suspect fled but was located and arrested. The male was found in possession of copper wiring and tools and faces related charges.

Emergency Landing

On August 26, 2016, Richmond RCMP was dispatched to an emergency plane landing at YVR. The flight, which contained 114 people, reported smoke in the cabin area. The plane and occupants landed safely. The problem was linked to a malfunctioning air conditioning unit.

2. Analysis of Crime Statistics

Arson

In August 2016 there were five incidents of arson, which is a 25% increase from August 2015 and 10.5% increase in year-to-date total. Arson at this time is within the 5-year average statistical range.

Assault with a Weapon

There were 12 assaults with a weapon, which is an increase of 71.4% from August 2015 and a 10% increase year-to-date total. Assault with a weapon is just above the 5-year statistical average range.

Drugs

There were 68 drug incidents, which is a decrease of 17% from August 2015 and a 15.3% increase in the year-to-date total. Drug incidents are within the 5-year statistical average range.

Residential Break and Enter

There were 46 break and enters, which is a decrease of 11.5% from August 2015 and a 19.8% decrease in year-to-date total. Residential break and enters are below the 5-year statistical average range.

Sexual Assault

There were six sexual offences, which is a 20% increase from August 2015 and a 61.1% increase in the year-to-date total. Sexual offences are within the 5-year statistical average range.

Shoplifting

There were 65 shoplifting thefts, which is a 3% increase from August 2015 and a 38.9% increase in the year-to-date total. Shoplifting is within the 5-year statistical average range.

Theft from Auto

There were 190 thefts from auto incidents, which is a 13% decrease from August 2015 and a 16.8% increase in the year-to-date total. Theft from auto is within the 5-year statistical average range.

Violent Crime

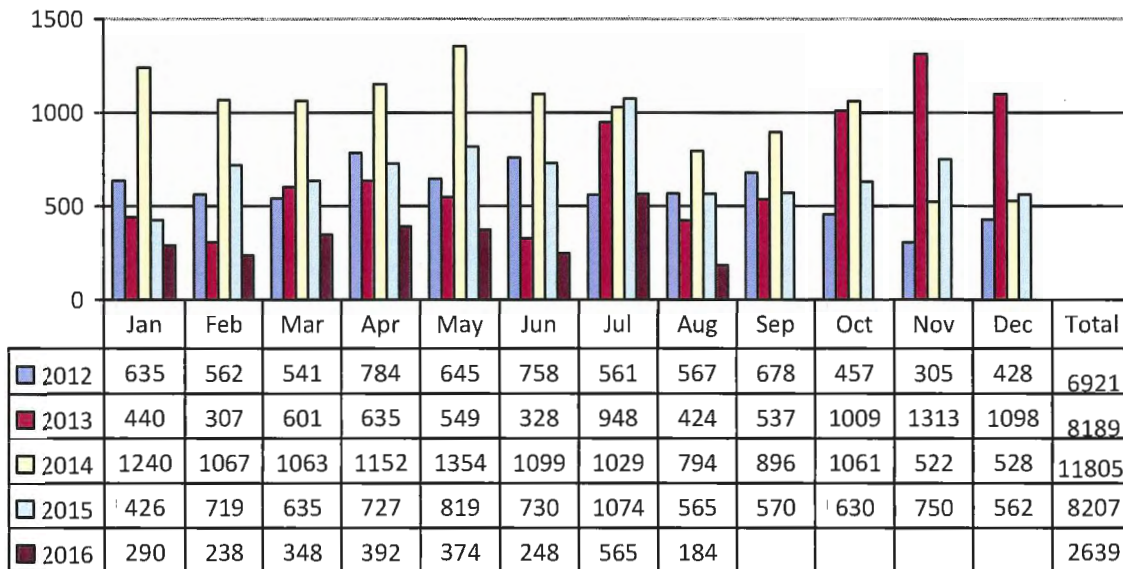
There were 112 violent crime incidents, which is a 13% increase from August 2015 and a 20.3% increase in the year-to-date total. Violent crime is within the 5-year statistical average range.

3. Auxiliary Constables

At the end of August 2016, Richmond RCMP Detachment (the Detachment) had a total complement of 38 auxiliary constables who provided 184 volunteer hours in August. This is a 67% reduction of hours from July 2016 and a 67% reduction from August 2015. Volunteer hours remain significantly reduced in 2016 due to directives from the RCMP National Headquarters. Auxiliary constables are now required to have RCMP officers in attendance at events.

Figure 1 compares the monthly hours of service provided by month from 2012 to 2016.

Auxiliary Constables Activities

Block Watch: Participated in Block Watch events and assisted with Block Watch captain training hosted by the Detachment.

Crime Reduction: Participated in community outreach with RCMP officers and community policing volunteers in response to identified criminal activity trends. Block Watch was promoted in neighborhoods that had experienced recent break and enters.

Crime Watch: Provided support to Crime Watch volunteers on weekend patrols.

ICBC Counterattack Campaign: Assisted RCMP officers in conducting road checks to promote public awareness of the dangers of impaired driving.

Night Markets: Assisted by providing a police presence on weekends at these events.

Project 529: Participated in the delivery of this bike registry program in Richmond.

4. Block Watch

Block Watch Activities

Announcement: On August 9, 2016 the new Block Watch Coordinator commenced her role at the Detachment.

Block Watch: At the end of August 2016 the Block Watch program had 427 groups containing 9,852 participants. Currently the program includes 569 captains having decreased by one captain and increased by four groups and 25 participants during the last month.

Events: On August 21, 2016 there were three Block Watch events that took place at 3200 block of Regent Street, Candlewood Drive and Smith Drive. Auxiliary Constable Volunteers attended. Auxiliaries provided information on crime prevention initiatives and registered bikes in relation to Project 529.

Outreach: On August 23, 2016 Crime Prevention conducted targeted and direct outreach in support of Block Watch. The Community Response Team (CRT) was deployed with members of the Crime Prevention Unit and attended the area of Lucas Road and Gilbert Road. This area, which currently has no Block Watch program, was contacted through a door to door initiative. As a result a potential captain and co-captain were identified. Several bikes were registered and information was provided on several crime prevention programs.

5. Community Police Station Programs

Community Police Station Activities

Bike Patrol: Volunteers participated in 11 deployments totaling 100 hours.

Distracted Driver's: On August 17, 2016, City Centre and South Arm volunteers attended the family movie night at King George Park. The Distracted Driver's obstacle course was deployed and the youth participated in the fatal vision goggles.

Fail to Stop: Volunteers participated in 26 Fail to stop deployments at various intersection locations throughout Richmond. 973 warning letters were sent to the registered owner's for vehicles found in violation.

Family Picnic: On August 7, 2016, volunteers attended the Bodhi Meditation Centre at King George Park for a family picnic. Volunteers hosted an information table, deployed the Distracted Driver's obstacle course, Lock-Out Auto Crime and bike patrols.

Foot/Van Patrols: Volunteers participated in 17 deployments totaling 89 hours.

Youth Camp: August 10, 2016, a volunteer assisted at the Cambie Community Centre youth camp.

Project 529: August 16, 2016, a volunteer assisted with Project 529 bike registry at Garry Point Park.

Analysis

75 Distracted Driver letters were sent resulting in a 13.6% increase compared to August 2015 and a 63% increase compared to July 2016.

2314 Lock Out Auto Crime notices were sent resulting in a 24% decrease compared to August 2015 and a 32% decrease compared to July 2016.

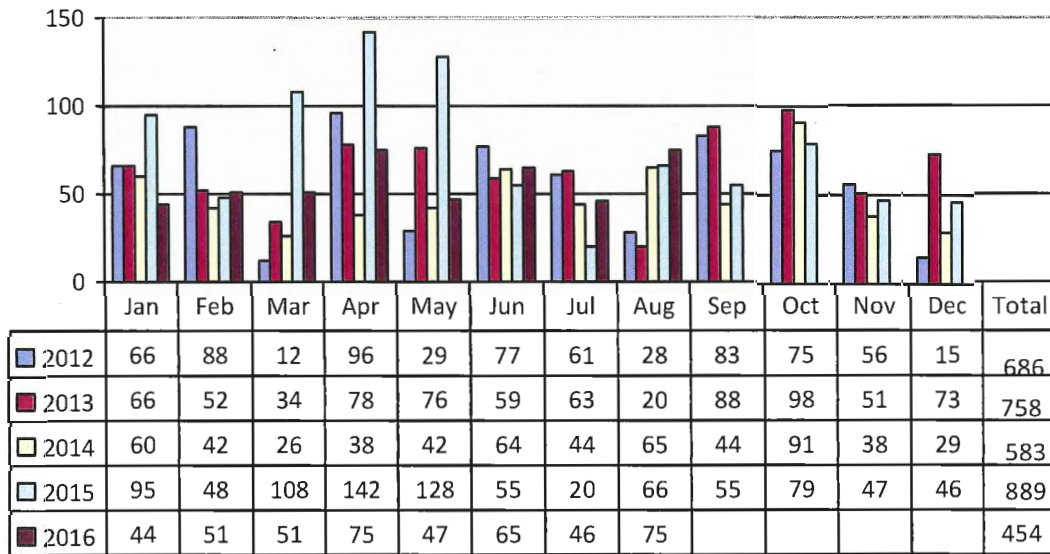
753 Speed Watch letters sent resulting in a 20% decrease compared to August 2015 and a 1.5% increase compared to July 2016

Community police stations continue to enhance the Detachment's policing service by providing an array of crime prevention resources and community safety initiatives. City staff and volunteers pursued safety initiatives which enhanced crime prevention program awareness, community engagement, police accessibility and reduced anxiety and fear levels related to crime. The demographics of the program vary from month to month based on weather conditions, seasonal initiatives, events and the availability of the volunteers.

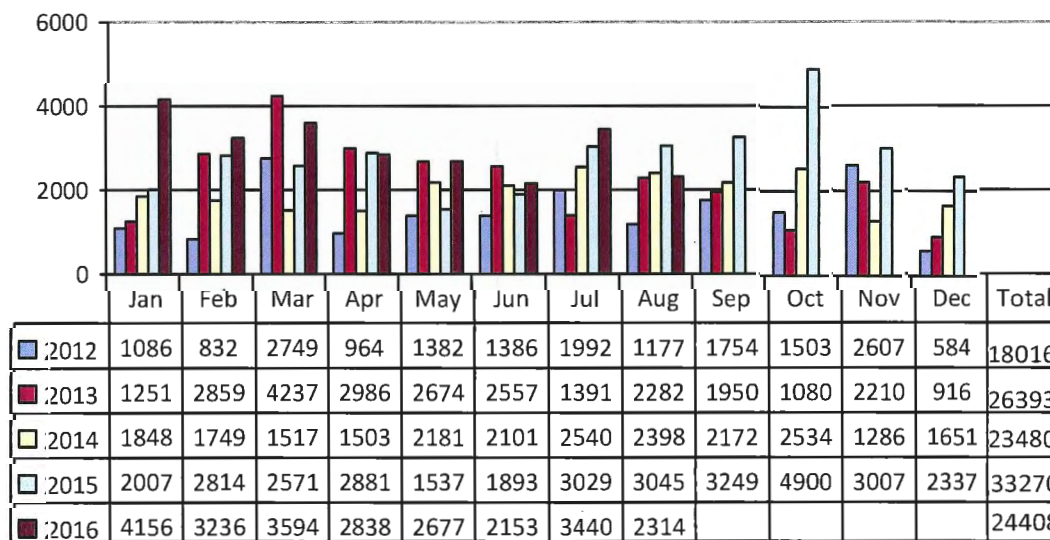
Figure 2: Distracted Driver Letters Sent

Figure 2 provides a comparison by year of the number of letters sent to registered owners.

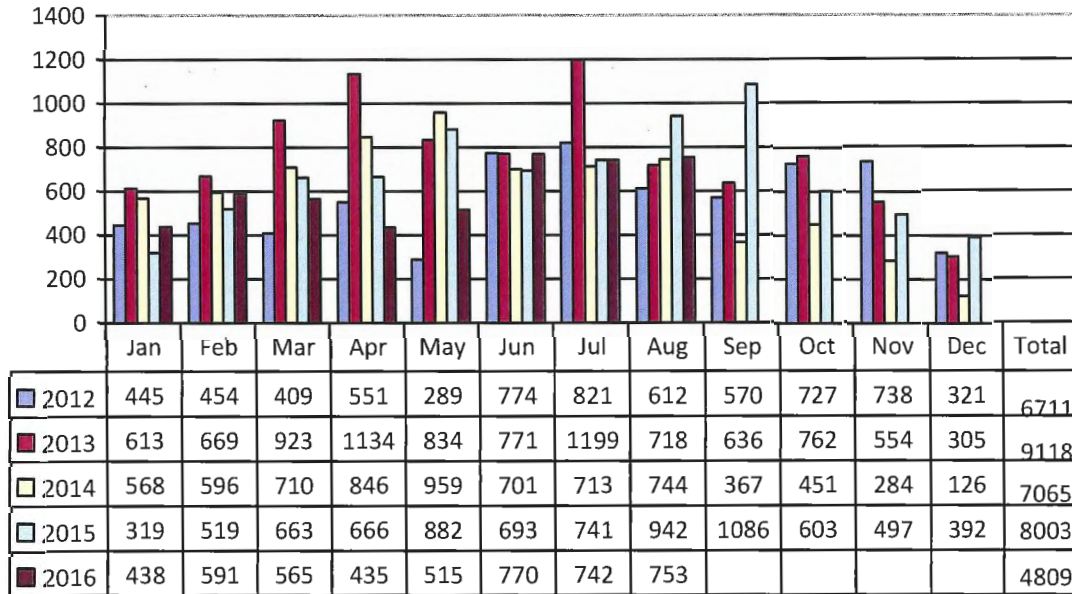
Figure 3: Lock Out Auto Crime Vehicles Issued a Notice

Figure 3 provides a comparison by year of the number of vehicle notices issued.

6. Crime Prevention Unit

Crime Prevention Activities

Detachment Mobile Application: Attended meetings with applications developers and policing partners to establish best practices continue with a goal to have material for Detachment senior management in the fall.

Project 529 Bike Registry: Crime Prevention hosted the following outreach events:

- August 6 – Steveston/Maritime Festival
- August 16 – Garry Point Park

In addition Crime Prevention provided training to Transit Police to facilitate their integration of Project 529 with local and regional efforts.

Toy Drive: Planning has commenced for the Christmas Fund Toy Drive.

Volunteer Training: Crime Prevention is coordinating the upcoming volunteer training planned for September at City Hall.

7. Road Safety Unit

The Road Safety Unit makes Richmond's roads safer through evidence-based traffic enforcement, investigation of serious vehicle collisions, and public education programs. The statistics below compare August 2016 data to both June and July 2016.

The Moving Violations category refers to violations such as unsafe lane change and unsafe passing. The Vehicle category refers to motor vehicle regulation defects such as no insurance and no lights. The Other category refers to other motor vehicle infractions such as miscellaneous charges including fail to remain at the scene of accident and failing to stop for police.

8. Victim Services

- In August 2016 Richmond RCMP Victim Services provided on-going support to 67 clients and attended 12 crime/trauma scenes. The unit maintains an active caseload of 150 on-going files.
- In addition Victim Services provides on-going emotional support to medical related sudden deaths and family conflict and general dysfunction. Some cases were referred for long term assistance.

9. Youth Section

Youth Section Activities

Cambie Community Centre: August 23, 2016, Youth Section members attended this day camp to provide a presentation on the role of police in the community.

Camp Courage: August 10, 2016, Richmond RCMP and Richmond Fire Rescue hosted one-day camps at various Community Centers throughout Richmond. Camp Courage provides children aged 9 to 12 an opportunity to find out what it's like to be a police officer and fire fighter. Children learn about the training, responsibilities and equipment involved through demonstrations and activities. A fee of \$25 per child covers a T-shirt, supplies and pizza lunch.

Crime Reduction Patrol Focus: During August, Youth Section conducted vehicle and foot patrols in Steveston and the City Centre as part of the Detachment's crime reduction strategy.

Crime Prevention Project: August 17, 2016, Youth Section teamed up with Crime Prevention to conduct a multi-faceted theft prevention project. Plainclothes and uniformed personnel were deployed in various neighborhoods throughout Richmond.

Kidropolis: August 12, 2016, Youth Section members attended a day camp to provide a presentation on the role of police in the community.

Park Summer Fun Nights: August 3, 2016, Youth Section attended this event.

SAFE Planning: Youth Section members met with primary, secondary and post-secondary schools to update SAFE (School Action for Emergencies) plans. The SAFE plan is an operational computer database that was released nationally in September 2007. This police application delivers site-specific emergency response plans to help front-line members respond efficiently and effectively to critical incidents. The initiative is part of the RCMP's ongoing commitment to youth and building safer communities.


School Visits: Youth Section attended several schools over August providing summer programming. Officers also provided routine, proactive visits to these schools to connect with students and teachers.

Auxiliary Constables

- The primary mandate of Richmond's Auxiliary Constables is to support community policing activities related to public safety and crime prevention.

Block Watch

- Community-based crime prevention program aimed at helping neighbors organize themselves to prevent crime.
- Residents can receive email alerts of neighbourhood residential break and enters by registering their email addresses at: blockwatch@richmond.ca

Difference Maker Project

- The Difference Maker Project is an off-shoot of the School Sports Programs. Elementary school students are mentored by teachers, police officers and community ambassadors. This activity aims to encourage social and civic responsibility amongst elementary and secondary school aged youth through community projects.

Distracted Driving Program

- Trained volunteers monitor intersections and observe distracted drivers.
- A letter is sent to the registered owner of the offending vehicle with information on the safety risks associated to the observed behaviour and applicable fine amounts.

Fail to Stop

- Trained volunteers monitor areas that have been referred to the program by local businesses or residents where drivers are not making a full stop at the stop sign, or running a red light.
- An information letter is sent to the registered owner of the vehicle advising them the date, time and location and applicable fine amounts if the driver received a violation ticket.

Lock Out Auto Crime

- Co-sponsored by the Insurance Corporation of BC (ICBC), volunteers patrol city streets and parking lots looking for automobile security vulnerabilities.
- Notices supplied by ICBC are issued to every vehicle inspected indicating to the owner what issues need to be addressed in order to keep the vehicle and contents secure.

Project 529

- This program allows riders to easily and securely register their bikes. This up-to-date database of bikes alerts its registrants if a fellow 529 bike is stolen.
- Project 529 is a unique, multi-national registry that holds a database of all registered and stolen bikes.

Speed Watch

- Co-sponsored by ICBC, promotes safe driving habits by alerting drivers of their speed.
- Trained volunteers are equipped with radar and a speed watch reader board that gives drivers instant feedback regarding their speed.
- Volunteers record the license plate number and the speed, and a letter is sent to the registered owner of the offending vehicle. The letter includes the date, time and location and applicable fine amounts if the driver received a violation ticket.

Stolen Auto Recovery

- Co-sponsored by ICBC, trained volunteers equipped with portable computers identify stolen vehicles.
- These volunteers recover hundreds of stolen vehicles each year throughout the Lower Mainland.

Volunteer Bike and Foot Patrol Program

- Trained volunteers patrol Richmond neighbourhoods reporting suspicious activities and providing a visible deterrent to crime and public order issues.



August 2016 STATISTICS

This chart identifies the monthly totals for all founded Criminal Code incidents, excluding Traffic Criminal Code. Based on Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) scoring, there are three categories: (1) Violent Crime, (2) Property Crime, and (3) Other Criminal Code. Within each category, particular offence types are highlighted in this chart. In addition, monthly totals for Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (CDSA) incidents are included.

The Average Range data is based on activity in a single month over the past 5 years. If the current monthly total for an offence is above average, it will be noted in **red**, while below-average numbers will be noted in **blue**.

Year-to-Date percentage increases of more than 10% are marked in **red**, while decreases of more than 10% are **blue**. Please note that percentage changes are inflated in categories with small numbers (e.g.: Sexual Offences).

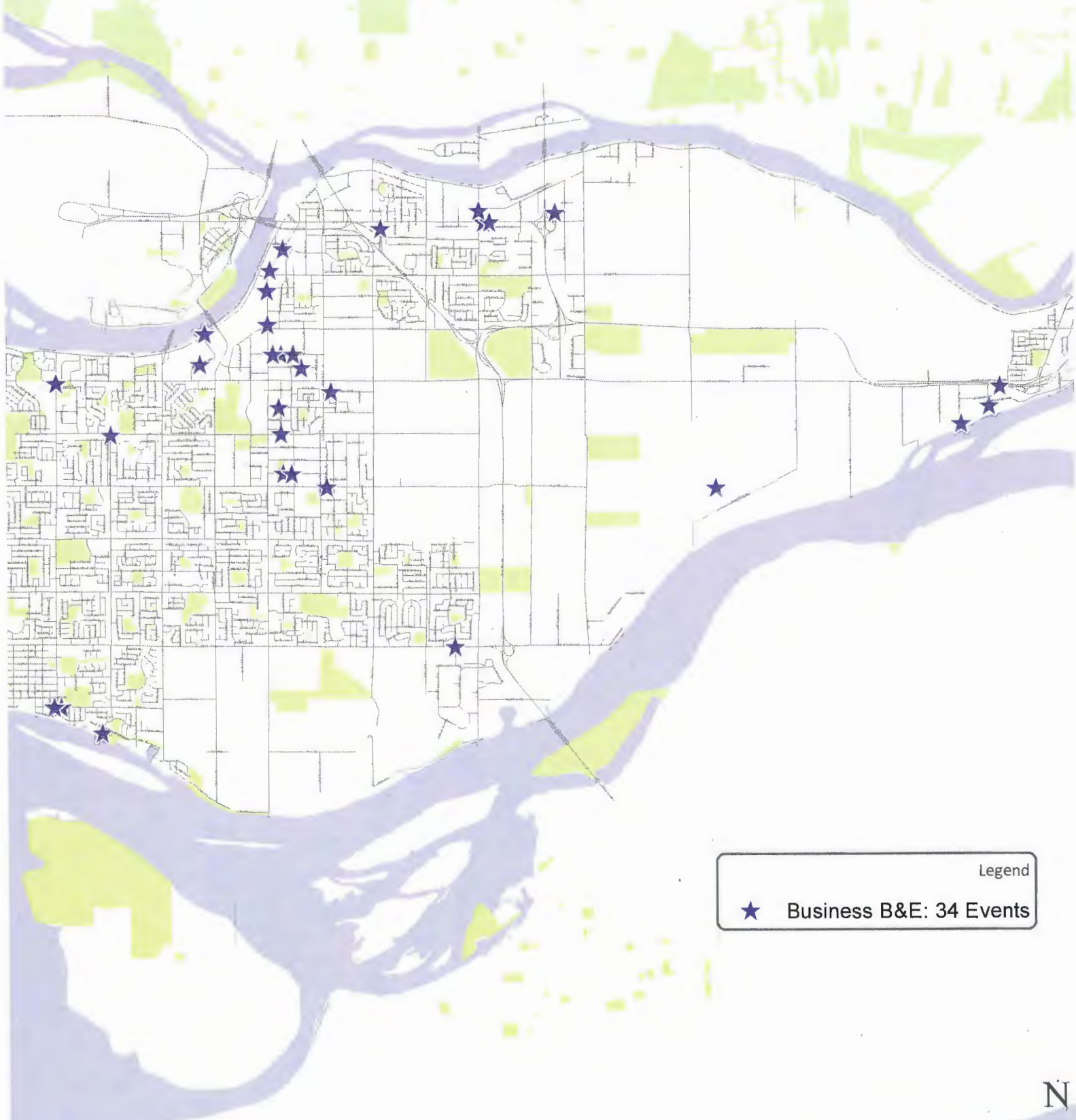

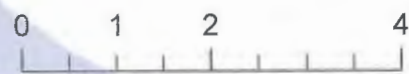
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Business B&E August 2016

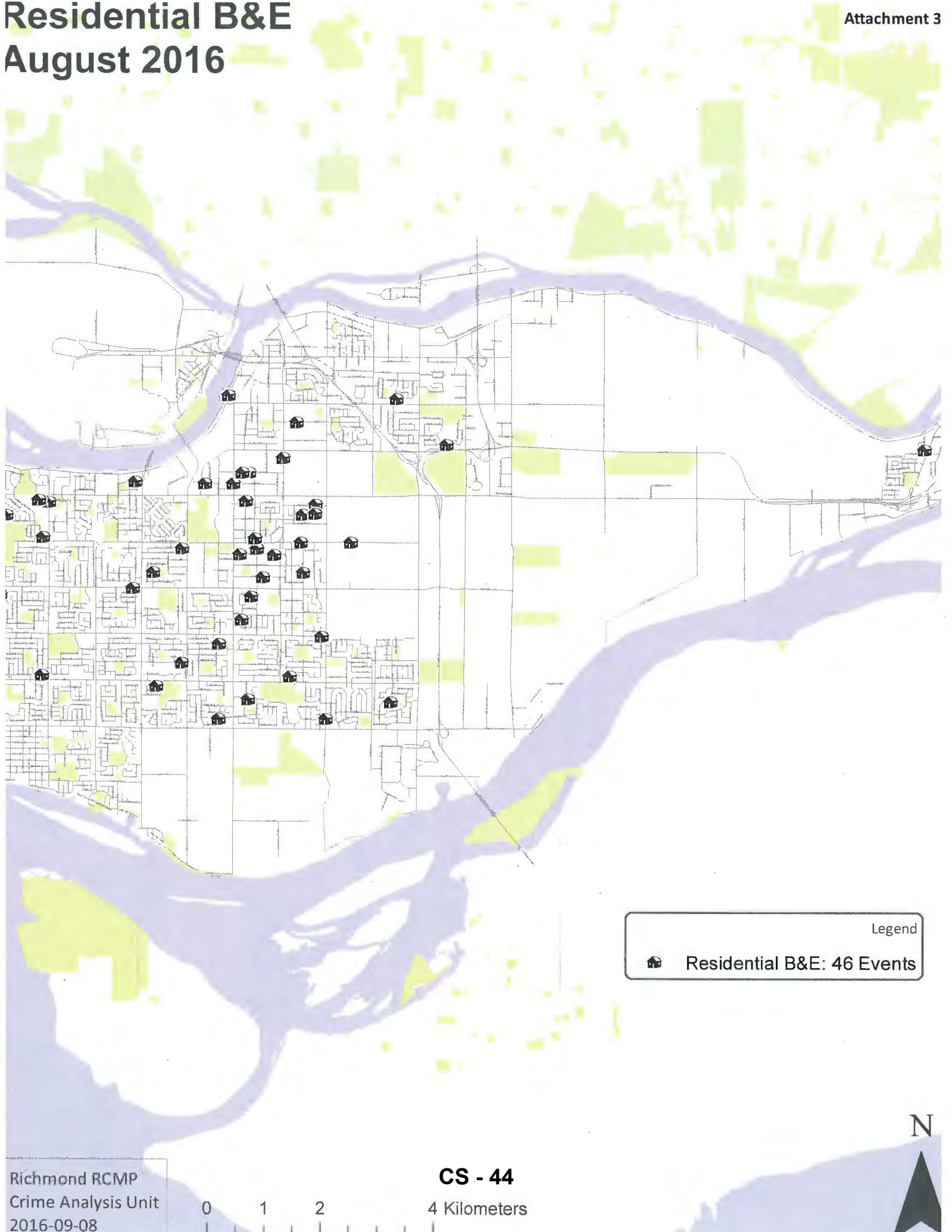

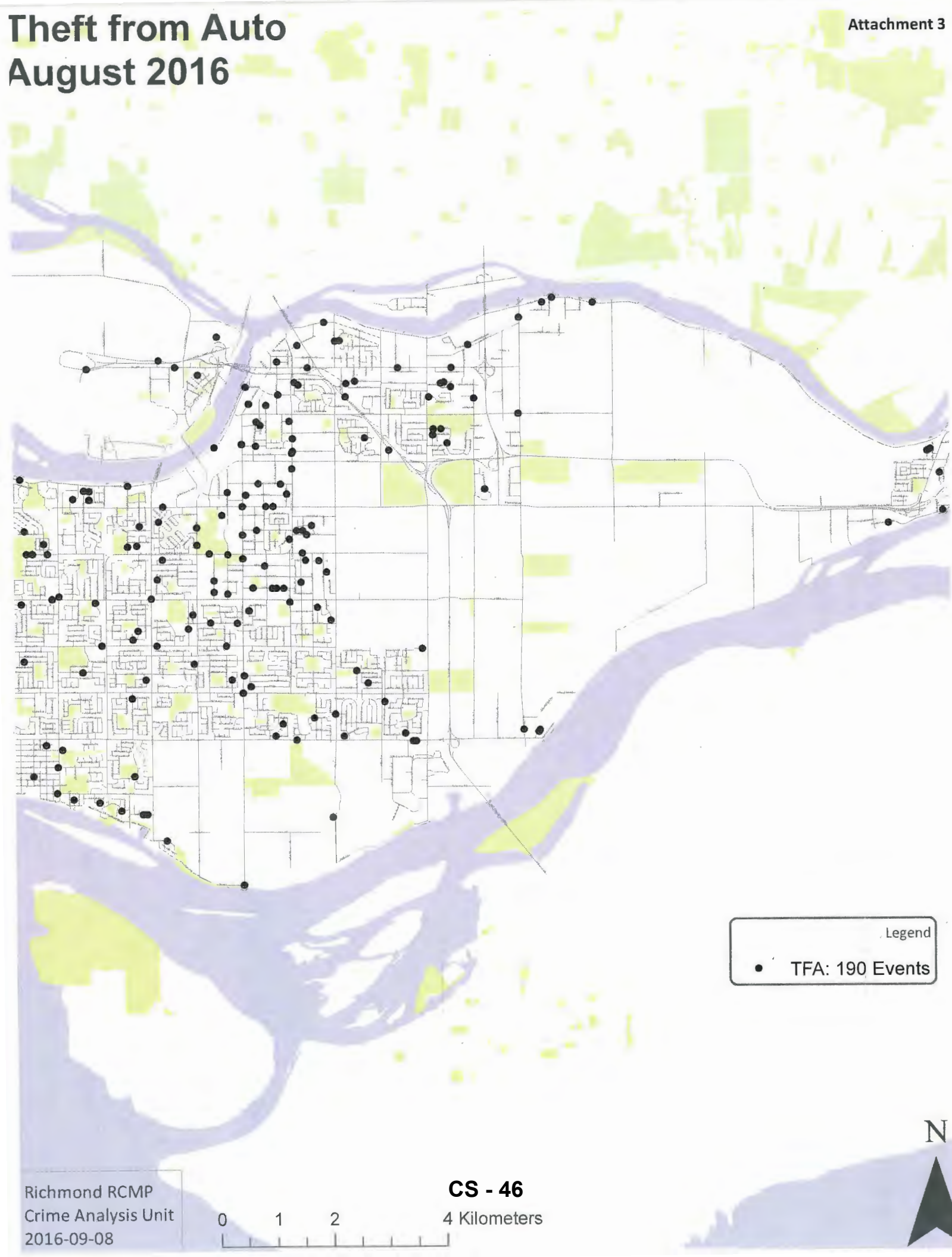
