Staff Report

Origin

Council established the Richmond Spirit of BC Committee in 2004. Terms of Reference for this Committee are attached. (Attachment 1). The purpose of the Committee is to ensure the community of Richmond fully capitalizes on the benefits of British Columbia's hosting of the 2010 Winter Olympics and Paralympics.

The Committee is directed to report to Council on activities of the past year and outline the work plan for the upcoming year.

Findings Of Fact

The Committee has worked over the past year to clarify its role in the community and has engaged the community in helping to determine its direction for 2007. Over the past year, the Committee has also been involved in a number of events and developed relationships with key organizations such as 2010 Legacies Now, Spirit of BC and the Richmond Olympic Business Office.

An update Report to Council from the Richmond Spirit of BC Committee that summarize the activities over the past year and its work plan for 2007 is attached. (Attachment 2).

Financial Impact

The Committee has requested a 2007 budget of \$30,000 to support the initiatives proposed in their work plan. There is currently \$5,000 in the City's base budget and an Additional Level Request has been submitted for consideration in the 2007 budget process. In addition, there is staff time required to support and liase with this committee.

Conclusion

The Spirit of BC Committee has contributed a significant number of volunteer hours to develop their priorities, build relationships and create an identity in the community. This committee is committed to ensuring that Richmond develops legacies as a result of the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Games being hosted in BC.

RICHMOND SPIRIT OF BC COMMITTEE TERMS OF REFERENCE

Purpose

The purpose of the Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force is to ensure the community of Richmond fully capitalizes on the benefits of British Columbia's hosting of the 2010 Winter Olympics and Paralympics.

Principles

City Council has established these following guiding principles for activities supported by the City and its community partners. They are:

- All 2010 activities are within the guidelines as outlined from the Provincial Secretariat and Vancouver Organizing Committee for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games (VANOC);
- Builds community capacity and encourages community involvement;
- Creates a unified vision for how Richmond can participate in and benefit from the Games;
- Creates financially sustainable outcomes;
- Directly benefits and leaves legacies for the community of Richmond;
- Encourages effective relationships and partnerships with others;
- Promotes active living; participation and excellence in sport;
- Promotes and celebrates our diversity; tolerance and understanding;
- Promotes economic development and tourism;
- Promotes environmental sustainability;
- Promotes learning; and,
- Promotes the arts, culture and our heritage.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force must reflect the adopted principles in all its activities.

Membership

Richmond City Council appoints members of the Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force and its chair. There are up to 14 members, plus a liaison member from City Council.

Representatives must apply to participate on the Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force. The City will seek new members for the Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force through a public call for applications.

Candidates will be chosen to reflect a broad spectrum of community sectors, which may include, Arts, Athletes, Business, Persons with Disabilities, Education, Environment, First Nations, Health, Heritage, Multicultural, Recreation, Seniors, Social Services, Sports, Tourism, Transportation, Volunteers and Youth.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force will have a two-year term, effective from its appointment.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force will seek staff and public input and feedback throughout the process.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force will report twice annually to Council on the activities of the past year and outline the work plan and progress on the work plan for the upcoming year.

At the beginning of each year, a member of the Task Force will be appointed as chair. This individual will facilitate and chair the meetings.

Members are expected to attend all meetings. If unable to attend meeting, an alternate is not required.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force has the authority to create sub-Committees to work on a variety of initiatives. Sub-Task Forces may include members from outside the Task Force.

City staff appointed by the Corporate Program and Management Group will attend meetings as technical support and will administer the Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force budget.

Objectives and Expectations

The primary objectives for the Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force are:

- 1. To build a unified vision and plan for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Games for the community of Richmond.
- 2. To ensure the community of Richmond capitalizes on and receives the maximum benefits and legacies from the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Games.
- 3. To determine, propose and act upon opportunities that add value, dimension and benefit to the Games by supporting the three pillars (culture, sport and environment) of the Olympic movement.
- 4. To ensure the three Olympics components of sustainability (environmental, social and economic) are promoted and adhered to.
- 5. To ensure that the community is aware of the benefits and legacies of hosting the Games.
- 6. To seek sponsorship for the programs and activities that are developed.
- 7. To promote community involvement.
- 8. To identify possible areas of negative impact and recommend actions to mitigate.
- 9. To coordinate the community of Richmond's activities in support of the Olympic and Paralympic Games with the Province of BC's 2010 Secretariat and other community opportunities Task Forces.

Procedures

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force will report to Council through the City staff.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force decision process is to be consensus based. If some members disagree with the Task Force's recommendations or activities, decisions will be recorded in the meeting records.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force will receive administrative staff support services from the City for the preparation of agendas and the recording of meetings.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force will liaise with the 2010 Provincial Secretariat in coordination with the City of Richmond.

Liaison with the Vancouver Organizing Task Force of the Olympic Games (VANOC) will be only through the City of Richmond staff.

Communications to Council from the Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force will be coordinated through City of Richmond staff.

The Chair would be elected on the first meeting of the Task Force from among the members appointed. A new chair would be elected annually.

Council may amend these terms of reference at its discretion.

Meetings

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force meetings are open to the public; however, the public will not be able to participate in the meetings except through a delegation process.

The Task Force will establish the meeting schedule annually.

Copies of the agenda and record of the meetings will be circulated to Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force members in advance.

Code of Conduct

Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force members are expected to be respectful towards each other and work cooperatively.

The Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force members are drawn from a broad spectrum of community interests. The expectation is that each member will conduct themselves in the best interest of all of Richmond residents.

If there is a conflict of interest, it will be up to the member to remove himself or herself from the decision.

Richmond 2010 Community Opportunity Task Force members serve at the pleasure of Council.



Richmond Spirit of BC Committee Update to Council

The Spirit of BC Committee was established by the City of Richmond "to ensure that the community of Richmond fully capitalizes on the benefits of British Columbia's hosting of the 2010 Winter Olympics and Paralympics".

This report is intended to update Richmond City Council on the activities of the Committee and to receive their input on the direction the Committee is taking.

Members of the Richmond Spirit of BC Community Committee are: Ronald Coleman, Chair; Michael McCoy, Vice-Chair; Bill McNulty, Council Liaison; Florence Gordon; Mahmood Awan; Glenn Kishi; Tracy Lakeman; Iris Lo; Elizabeth Specht; Jack Wong; Ed Gavsie; Joanne Rocque; Vince Miele and Thomas Yu. There is currently one vacancy on the committee.

In October 2005, Council extended the original term of this committee to June 2010 and made a decision that the term of appointments for individual members will be for two years, with the terms to be staggered. With that in mind, at the end of December 2006, there will be 8 vacancies on the Committee.

Role of Richmond Spirit of BC Committee:

The Richmond Spirit of BC Community Committee is one of 95 community committees in British Columbia. The Spirit of BC Community Committees program was launched by the Province of BC to ensure that all communities across the Province have the opportunity to capitalize on the opportunities generated as a result of the Olympics being hosted here in 2010.

Update on Committee Activities

Over the past year, the Richmond Spirit of BC Committee has been involved in a number of activities:

Planning

- The committee has continued to refine our Mission, Vision (see Attachment A)
- On September 14, 2006, we hosted a Round Table, involving representatives from a range of organizations in 4 key Legacy Areas (Arts; Sport and Recreation; Literacy and Volunteers). A copy of the Backgrounder developed for this session is attached (Attachment B).

Out of the Round Table discussions, the committee has identified 4 key initiatives that will be pursued with Community Partners. The role of the Spirit of BC Committee is to identify potential leaders and organizations in the community that will take the lead on the various initiatives, with support of the Spirit of BC Committee. Our goal is to add value in encouraging and supporting legacies in Richmond.



• After a very successful 2006 Spirit of BC Week, the committee has already begun work on the 2007 event and will be meeting with a variety of community organizations to encourage them to provide activities during the week. Dates have been set as February 9 – 17, 2007. It is anticipated the Spirit of BC Week will happen each year up to and including 2010 and it is the goal of the Richmond Committee to develop this into a significant event that may continue past 2010.

• The Committee has developed a Newsletter (**Attachment D**), which will be used to assist with promoting the Richmond Spirit of BC initiatives and has also developed a PowerPoint presentation to assist with meetings with community organizations.



2007 Goals

Over the past year, there has been a considerable amount of time spent by the committee developing our direction and beginning to promote the concept of Spirit of BC. The Committee is now in a better position to begin engaging the community and as noted above, as a result of our planning session will soon be meeting with stakeholders in the key Legacy areas to look at the possibility of moving forward on the key legacy initiatives.

The **legacy initiatives** that have been identified and that we will be further investigating are:

- Arts exploring the possibility of a multi-media, multidisciplinary Arts Centre and/or an Annual Arts Festival;
- Literacy the initiative identified in this area is to develop a Literacy Centre and/or an initiative to ensure "every resident of Richmond has a Library Card";
- Sports and Recreation investigating the development of an initiative supporting getting "youth at risk: into sport and recreation activities; and
- Volunteerism building a team of well recognized, well-managed, well-trained, easy-toaccess group of volunteers in the City of Richmond, possibly with a "Centre of Volunteer Excellence".

Each of these initiatives must be further defined and plans put in place to achieve them. The Committee realizes that some of these initiatives may be too ambitious, but at this time, will be fully exploring what IS possible to achieve.

Spirit of BC Week – 2007

Building on the success of the event in 2006, the committee will be working with 2010
Legacies Now, Spirit of BC and a range of community partners to promote and coordinate a
successful week-long event showcasing the 4 Legacy Areas – Arts, Literacy, Sport &
Recreation and Volunteerism. We will also be working towards partnerships with the local
media and Legacies Now, Spirit of BC

Recognition Program

• The committee is in the process of developing a program to recognize individuals and organizations that contribute to "Spirit" in Richmond. In 2007, the goal is to recognize 25,000 individuals and/or organizations.

Building Relationships

- 2010 Legacies Now, Spirit of BC The Richmond Committee will continue to liase with 2010 Legacies Now, Spirit of BC. We have been asked to host a Round Table for the Spirit of BC Committees in the Mainland Region in late November. We also anticipate attendance at Workshops LegaciesNow may provide over the coming year.
- Richmond Chamber of Commerce 2010 Committee The committee will work collaboratively with the Chamber of Commerce 2010 Committee to identify opportunities.



• Richmond Olympic Business Office (ROBO) – The committee will work to support the goals of ROBO as required.

Communication

• To support the above activities, the committee will develop appropriate communication pieces such as newsletters, flyers and presentation materials. We will also be working with the City of Richmond to establish a web page on the City of Richmond's website to promote Richmond Spirit of BC initiatives.

RICHMOND KICKS OFF 2ND ANNUAL TOUR

The City of Richmond hosted the first stop in this year's 2010 Legacies Now Connecting Communities Tour on August 31st at Richmond Centre Mall. The 2,000 square-foot display was crowded with families testing their winter sport skills and learning about opportunities created by the 2010 Winter Games.

Richmond Mayor Malcolm Brodie welcomed the crowd and marked the official opening of the tour which will visit ten communities throughout British Columbia. "It's exciting for Richmond to be selected as the first stop of this year's 2010 Legacies Now Connecting Communities Tour. This Tour is both educational and fun and an excellent way to build community spirit around the 2010 Winter Games."

The Connecting Communities Tour, on the heels of a successful inaugural

season, is presented in partnership with Bell Canada and the Province of British Columbia. As a presenting sponsor, Bell Canada is contributing \$1 million over four years to help spread the excitement and spirit of the Vancouver 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Games throughout the province.

"Bell Canada is pleased to present the 2010 Legacies Now Connecting Communities Tour. This is part of our commitment to helping generate legacies now and long-after 2010 in the communities that we serve by supporting youth, local athletes and just as importantly, community and economic development," said Justin Webb, Vice President of Olympic Services for Bell Canada.

For the next two months, the tour will travel over 5,500 kilometers, visiting 10 separate communities. The display will be open from Thursday through Sunday in each community.

LITERACY NOW IN VERNON

Literacy Now is assisting over 60 communities across British Columbia develop action plans to meet their local literacy needs. Here is a letter from Debbie Schiller, Coordinator for the Literacy Now Task Group in the Vernon area, who writes about the challenges facing literacy providers in her region and how her group of "Initiators" is working to overcome them.

In March, 2005, a small group of "Initiators" from the communities of Vernon, Coldstream, Lumby and Cherryville met to consider launching a Literacy Now initiative. We recognized that literacy programs and services in our region were mostly disconnected and focused in the larger Vernon community, with few or no services available in the outlying smaller communities. It made sense for us to work as a small region, so we created the VCLC Literacy Now Task Group.

"Our task group worked hard to gather information from all literacy service providers and a diverse group of regional partners to fully reflect the hopes and dreams of each community."

On July 2, 2006, we proudly delivered our Regional Literacy Plan to 2010 Legacies Now.

Planning funds from 2010 Legacies Now allowed us to hire a researcher and two coordinators. The response we received from our communities was very positive. Partner meetings were well attended and individuals provided thoughtful feedback to our requests for information.

The VCLC Regional Literacy Plan is broad-based, focusing on issues rather than creating new programs. Our literacy goals are to:

- 1. Increase awareness of local literacy issues, programs and services.
- 2. Improve access to and communication between programs and services.
- 3. Address funding and other supports.
- 4. Establish a Literacy Centre for the region.

The VCLC Literacy Now Task Group and its community partners are motivated to carry out the objectives of the Literacy Plan. With implementation funds from 2010 Legacies Now, we will hire Literacy Coordinators to put our plan into action.

"Going through this process has already mobilized our communities to work together to meet the literacy needs of every person in the region."

The more than 90 Spirit of BC Community Committees across the province have one main thing in common - great people with the desire to build a stronger community. In Abbotsford, that team of great people is led by their Chair Christine Wiebe, who says people and partnerships have been the key to their committee's success.

In January 2004, Wiebe says an invitation to members of the community helped kick things up a notch for her committee. "We wanted to know if people felt Abbotsford should be involved in the opportunities that would likely come as a result of the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games."

"Our committee hoped for 150 at that meeting, and 225 attended. The electricity in the room was over the top! We knew we had to continue."

With funding from Human Resources and Social Development Canada (HRSDC), the Abbotsford Committee hired a full-time executive director. They also hired three assistants, for one year, thanks to an Employment Insurance program.

"Service Canada is always looking for opportunities through Job Creation Partnerships that will provide valuable work experience to unemployed clients while benefiting the broader local economy," says Brenda Wertman, Programs Officer with HRSDC. "We appreciate the opportunity to work with the Abbotsford Spirit of BC Community Committee and recognize the work they do in assisting our local area to maximize the opportunities that the Olympics and Paralympics will bring to our community."

In need of office space for their newlyhired staff, the Spirit of BC Community formed a fundraising committee in

December 2005. "We ended up with six cash sponsors offering \$10,000 over five years," says Wiebe. "We now have free office space for five years, with heat and light, furniture, telephones and a security system."

"Our committee achieved this through vision and passion, and by recognizing the opportunities that are out there for our community."

Wiebe is proud that Abbotsford has one of the first Spirit of BC Community Committee offices and the first 2010 Commerce Centre satellite office. She lists the committee's partnerships with HRSDC, the University College of the Fraser Valley, the City of Abbotsford, the Abbotsford school district and local businesses as essential components in their success.

Wiebe knows it can be overwhelming to start up a Spirit of BC Community Committee, or expand a committee's efforts, but says her committee's hard work is paying off. She offers the following advice for fellow Spirit of BC Community Committees:

- Bring the movers and shakers together in your community. Every committee needs people with energy and community spirit.
- Host a community strategy meeting.
 Find out what your community expects and wants from its Spirit of BC Community Committee.
- Set achievable goals and divide up tasks. Have people report on their progress.
- Work with your strong points. In other words, focus on what your community has to offer, whether it's a great curling facility, an active arts council or dedicated volunteers.
- And most importantly, have fun!

LiteracyNow. Through LiteracyNow, 2010 LegaciesNow will work with communities to become the most literate province in Canada and a global leader in literacy learning.


